KLAMATH BOY SAVES LIFE OF SMALL GIRL

KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 8.—Without stopping even to remove his coat, Fred Biehn, 15, plunged into the icy water of Spring creek, 35 miles north of here, yesterday, rescued from drowning Claire Hector, 4, and applied first aid to the strangling child before help reached them. No one was present when the child fell in, and she had gone under twice before Biehn reached her. This is the third accident of the kind that has happened to the Hector children. Their father is a local merchant. Young Biehn proved his level-headedness last spring when he led a trio of boys into the burning basement of the Riverside school and extinguished the blaze before the fire department arrived. He is a nephew of George Biehn of Portland.

FOUR MEN ARRESTED AFTER GUN BATTLE

OREGON CITY, Aug. 9.—Fred Benson and Dick Foster, farmers near Clarks; J. E. Watson, longshoreman of Portland, and a man by the name of Rusk of Portland were the principals in a fracas on the Benson farm, in which a gun is claimed to have been broken over Foster's head. Watson is alleged to have suffered from a splintered leg bone. Rusk has gone into hiding. The affair had its origin, according to a statement by Foster to Sheriff W. J. Wilson, in trespassing on the Foster place by the Benson children. Foster and Watson were arrested on complaints by Benson, and appeared before Justice of the Peace Noble Tuesday. Watson is charged with unlawfully and purposely pointing a gun toward Benson, and will be given a preliminary hearing Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. His bail was set at \$250. Foster is charged with assault and battery, pleaded not guilty, and has his bail set at \$100.

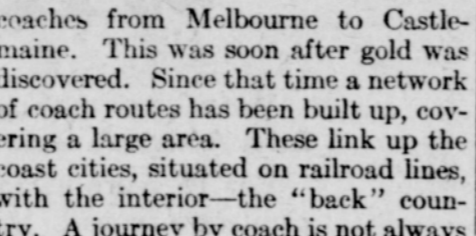

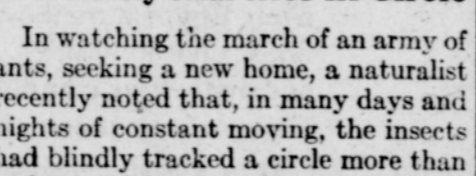
Travel by Stagecoach and Camels in Australia

The interior of Australia covers so vast an area that only a small portion of it can be reached by rail. In the early '50s an American started a line of stagecoaches from Melbourne to Castle-maine. This was soon after gold was discovered. Since that time a network of coach routes has been built up, covering a large area. These link up the coast cities, situated on railroad lines, with the interior—the "back" country. A journey by coach is not always a pleasant experience in Australia. South Australia lays claim to the doubtful honor of what is called the "dead finish" in coach travel. This is a trip from Haddon Downs to Farina, some 404 miles, and the fare, one way, is \$50. It is not a "de luxe" journey, as may be judged from the time-table, which states distinctly that "Female Passengers are Not Carried." Nor is the coach used at all times by the travelers. One coach line notifies its passengers that they "must be prepared to travel the latter part of the journey on camels."



Bracing Chimney Extension

A tinsmith who was confronted with the problem of erecting an extension on a low chimney, without attaching guy wires to the roof, braced the extension in the manner shown in the drawing. An iron band was bolted around the chimney as indicated, and stovebolts were fitted in holes drilled on each side, for the guy wires. The latter were fastened to the top of the chimney extension and to the stovebolts, and were spread apart by means of a steel hoop, which was held in position by wrapping each guy wire around it once. This bracing made the extension so strong that it has withstood the heaviest gales.



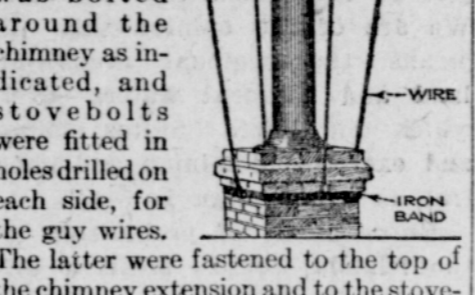
Attaching Wire to Concrete Posts

A good method of attaching wire to concrete fence posts is shown in the drawing. One side of the post, as far as it extends above the ground, has small grooves formed in it, about 2 in. apart. These grooves are made by wooden strips nailed to the face of the form in which the posts are made. The fence wire is laid in the grooves as shown, and bound in place by a short length of wire, passed around the concrete post and twisted around the fence wire.



Pail With Float Prevents Calf Drinking Too Fast

Fast drinking is a habit which careful stock raisers are anxious to correct in young calves, for if allowed to continue, it is likely to cause digestive disorders that affect the animal in after life. An effectual check against this is believed to have been found in a simple metal float that fits into a straight-sided pail in which it slowly drops as the calf feeds. A hole in the center of the float, the upper surface of which forms an inverted cone, regulates the flow of milk, and prevents its being drunk too fast.



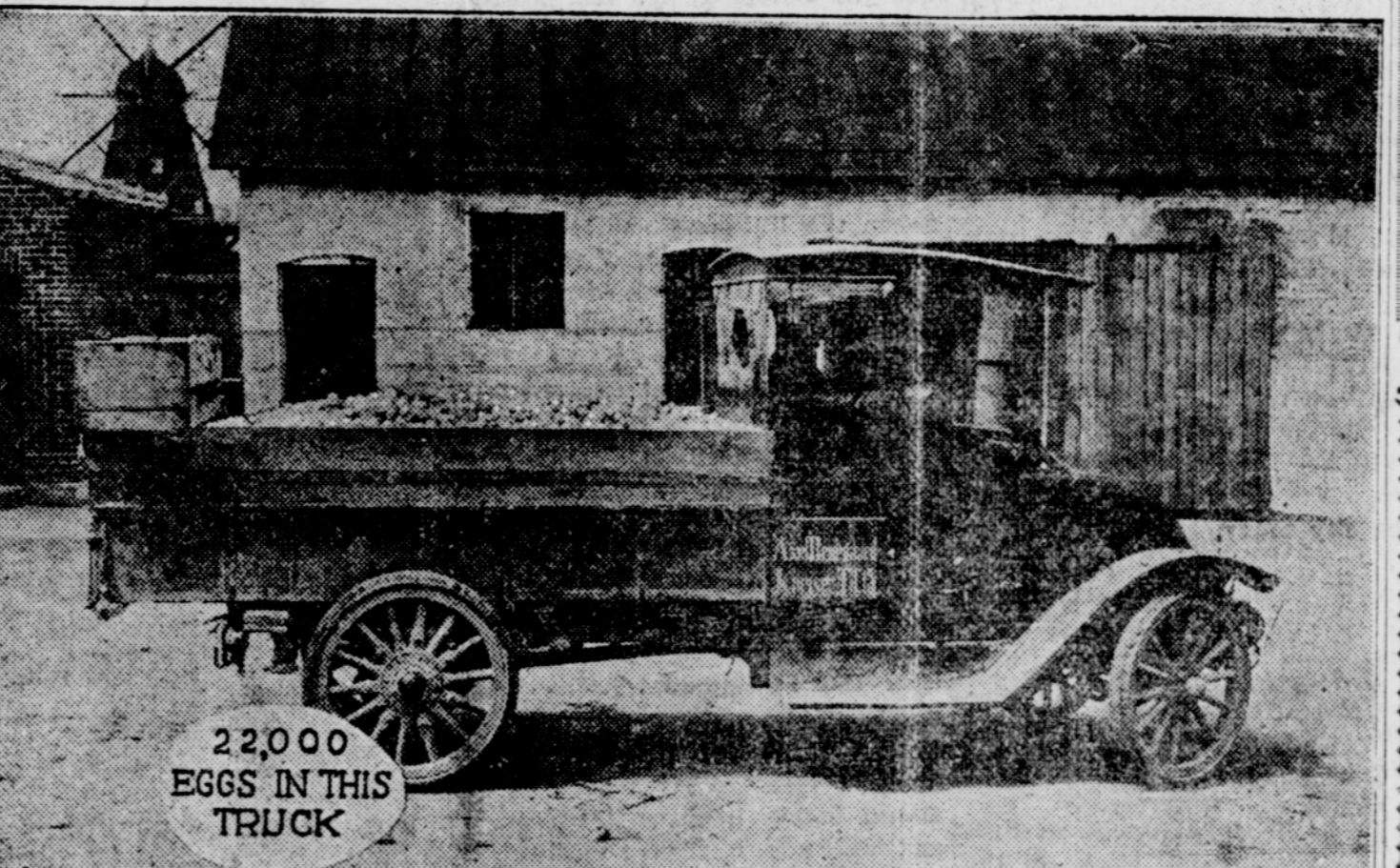
Theft Alarm Safeguards Car

The drawing shows a simple theft alarm that can be attached to any car, and will, when set, sound the horn and keep it sounding, the moment the emergency brake is released. It consists of a switch having two spring-contact blades located in a V-shaped slot, cut in the floorboard at right angles to the brake-lever slot, and a movable fiber arm that is pushed between the ends of the blades, after the brake lever is pulled back, so that the lever cannot be moved forward without dislodging the arm and closing the switch. When the owner uses the car, he pulls the arm back, so that the brake lever may be moved past without disturbing it.

FEED THE WHEAT SURPLUS TO BIDDY



(National Crop Improvement Service.) DENMARK has long been pointed out to the American farmer as the origin of sound and profitable farm practice, and the basis of all their agricultural practice is quality. "In eggs, for instance, the collections are made daily, loaded by the buyer or co-operative representative into trucks and sent to market with the bloom still on them. "An interesting point is that rats are not used—a layer of straw three-fourths inch thick is placed on the bottom of the truck

(which, by the way, is made in the United States), and the eggs loaded in bulk—22,000 of them in this load, and the breakage is no greater than in the egg cases used in this country. "Poultry may be a way out for some of our wheat growers," says Bert H. Lang, Vice President First National Bank, St. Louis, "because if the wheat grower has a good flock of poultry on his farm and feeds his inferior and shrunken wheat to it, the hens will market it for him in the shape of eggs on

a more profitable basis. Not only that, but the poor wheat is not dumped on the market to become drag on the good wheat. "Of course, some skim milk should be saved for the hens to give animal protein, except when bugs and grasshoppers are plentiful, and they should have good care; for the wheat grower might well try feeding his poor wheat to poultry and other farm animals and absorb the alleged surplus. At any rate I would help maintain a profit price on the milling grades.
