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are bothered by fleas; the city each child is a distinct problem in its self.

Standards vary widely, for different races, and for children brought up under different conditions, what would be correct for one child, would not be so for the next one.

There is an attempt to associate education, the most vital thing in American life today, as a smoke screen, not in the interest of education, but in the interest of medical exploitation, and dominance; the home and not the school is the place where the health of the children is a proper charge.

The best way to begin health work in the schools, is to start with what is "external conditions" such as cleanliness, heating, lighting, and ventilating, also provided dry places to play in; if these simple rules would be enforced there would be no need of a nurse whose interests in the welfare of the child is not and could not equal that of the parent.

Dr. Haven Emerson, professor of health administration, at Columbia University, said there is no one way of being healthy, there is no one diet; health is a matter of personal attainment, and not a general dispensation.

Children are the property of their parents, not the state, and school and medical association, "demonstration agent" to instruct in dressmaking, millinery and cooking, under the disguise that it will benefit the poor.

The agent meets and instructs (at the expense of the taxpayers) the retired high salaried (who in most cases rode to and from, in fine automobiles).

And now they are cleverly launching "the community kitchen" which is alright, if the one who patronizes, says, but we are opposed to it if the taxpayers must bear the financial burden.

At the expense of the taxpayers, there are too many factors entering into the make-up of American school children, yet must employ a flea catcher. A popular woman suggests

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That there be employed "a coun-

dition, by contending that the government is rendering a great-

service, and taxpayers should therefore be willing to pay for it; in many instances those extra services are unnecessary.

If we want lower taxes, it is our own business not to vote for the things that make taxes higher.

If we desire economy in public affairs, it is our own business not to urge any new expenditure; once the money is ordered spent and the spenders are put into office to spend it, there is nothing to bring relief. We must discourage new governmental fads and fancies which add unnecessary laws to our statute books with increased number of employees. We must trim down to the essentials.

Sometime, someone, must halt this increase, this multiplication of employees.
