MINING TOWNS ARE BUILT UP TO DATE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—The mining communities of southern West Virginia are, in nearly every case, more sanitary, better looking, neater, cleaner, and more comfortable than nearby communities where there are no mines, according to investigations made by the Bituminous Operators' Special Committee, headed by John C. Brydon, of Somerset, Pa., and created to assist the United States Coal Commission in getting at the real facts in the coal situation.

Investigation of living conditions in the Williamson district of West Virginia and Kentucky disclosed that the houses in many of the communities have been newly painted, and in various colors, that many neat fences and lawns are in evidence. In one community, on each side of the concrete entrance walk to each miner's house a tree has been planted. This was done by the mining company, which also is replacing all wooden fences, with new fences of wire to improve appearances. The houses built by the companies, the investigation showed, are far above the standard of the native houses.

Boy Scout organizations, American Legion posts, baseball teams, community service men and organizations, were noted. Most companies have auditoriums for moving picture shows. The companies are helped, and in some cases have done all the work, in building good roads. One company issues a monthly magazine for its men and their families. The district is a hundred per cent electrically lighted. The schools were found to be adequate, as were the churches, and medical attention excellent. One company has a contract with the hospital, whereby each miner pays \$1 a month and is given all treatment free of other charges if he falls ill. Where the regular school term is but six months, many of the companies pay the teachers' salaries for an additional two months in order that the children of the communities may have eight months of schooling each year.

Most of the advantages of the mining communities are due solely or partly to the mining companies, giving the so-called "mining camps" great advantages over other communities comparable in size.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Aug. 17.—Automobile registration plates, comprising number plates from every state in the Union, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Honolulu, Canal Zone, Municipality of Panama, Cuba, Scotland, Ireland, Isle of Man, Austria and Tokio, Japan, are the unique collection of which A. W. Kelly, manager of the William F. Nye oil plant at Fish Island, is the proud possessor.

The collection, begun in 1921, by Kelly as an experiment, was completed recently. The plates are of all varieties and color schemes. In the collection there are Massachusetts plates Nos. 1, 2, 4, 5, and 6. Several plates have interesting stories connected with them, as unfolded by the persons who forwarded them to Mr. Kelly.

Probably the most interesting and thrilling tale accompanies the number plate from Dublin, Ireland, which contains three bullet holes as the result of an encounter with Sinn Feiners. This plate was forwarded by one of the Nye company's agents in Dundee, Scotland. His letter accompanying the number plate reads as follows:

"The Crossley tender that this number plate came from was involved in an ambush in Brunswick street, Dublin, by Sinn Feiners. Lieutenant Farrell and Captain Beard, of the M. C., were killed in the fray. The number plate, as you will see, was pierced in three places by bullets fired by Sinn Feiners. Several of them were killed and wounded. With the aid of an automatic revolver we captured one of them. He was hanged at Mountjoy prison in April."

Added as a postscript is written: "The Sinn Feiners were trying to put the engine out of commission." Kelly obtained most of the plates by sending letters to the American Consuls requesting number plates from those countries. In one instance the desired number plate could not be obtained without purchasing an automobile to which the plate was attached. This plate was that of Melbourne, Australia. The Vice-Consul wrote that in Australia when a car leaves the factory it has attached at the rear a square metal plate whereon the number is painted in black letters on a white background when the car is registered.

STANDARD OIL BULLETIN
EXPLAINS GAS PRICES
A bulletin issued by the Standard oil company of California recently attempts to explain the reasons for the present low prices of gasoline as compared with the price in 1920. The difference according to the Company bulletin is due to the larger supply which is being produced now, as against the smaller supply in 1920.
The price is not controlled by the group of oil directors the bulletin states, but is set by the law of supply and demand. The high prices of 1920 encouraged speculation and the development of new oil fields and thus brought the supply much higher, the result being the lower prices prevailing at present according to the bulletin.
