2. Maintain a clearance of one sixteenth of an inch between the brake lining and the drum.

3. Scrape the brake lining clear of oil, road grit, and metal particles.

4. Keep the right and left brakes operating at equal pressure.

5. Test your brakes before starting your car, to make sure that both hand lever and foot lever have adequate clearance.

6. Never jam the brakes air thus make the tires slide.

7. Use the motor as a brake, in descending hills.
