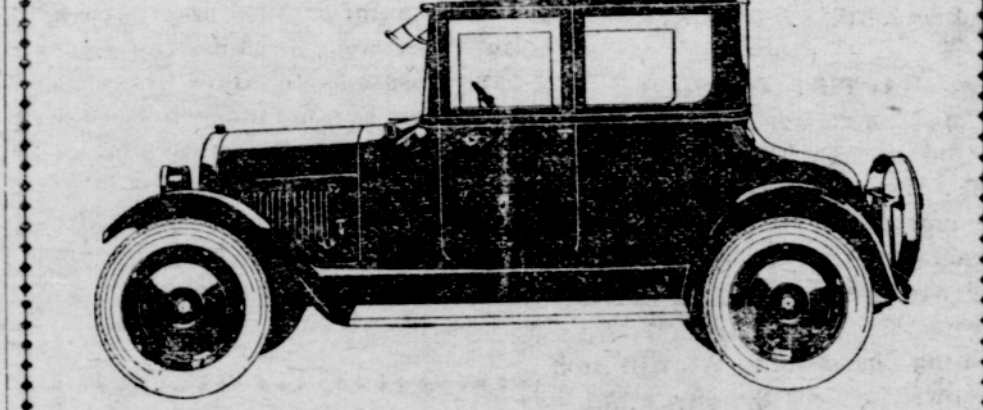

REMARKABLE RECORD MADE BY STAR CAR

PORTLAND, Aug. 25.—Few pages in history of the automobile industry present a greater accomplishment than the creation of the popular priced Star, its rapid advance into popular favor, and its quick rise into a high production and selling place among America's quantity production cars.

Since that time over 100,000 Stars have passed through the doors of the Durant factories into the hands of owners.

During the nine months since last November there have been registrations of 8730 new Stars in California. This is an average monthly sale of nearly 1,000 Stars in the Golden State alone without taking into account the big buying of them in Washington, Oregon and in fact the whole Pacific coast region.

NON-STOP DRIVING RECORD ESTABLISHED

DETROIT, Aug. 25.—A new record for non-stop driving was established here recently when H. L. (Daredevil) Lockwood piloted a Maxwell touring car for 116 consecutive hours without stopping at any time.

Lockwood, the self same Lockwood who gained fame by his drop from one moving airplane to another while in mid-air, by his human fly stunts, performed on various of the country's most famous skyscrapers, and by his many brilliant feats as a race driver, broke his own record for continuous driving by four hours.

At the conclusion of his Detroit run it was plainly evident that his physical endurance had been taxed to the utmost and he collapsed as the motor was stopped.

AUTOMOTIVE MARKET IS GREAT IN SMALL TOWNS

PORTLAND, Aug. 25.—Manufacturers of automotive products in seeking national distribution make frequent references to automobile registration. Figures compiled at the end of 1922 reveal many facts, one of the most interesting of which is that the greatest market for automotive products is found in towns of less than 10,000 population.

The records show that at the end of 1922 a total of 10,795,000 passenger cars were registered in the country. Of that number 910,000 or less than 9% were in cities of 500,000 population and over; 1,140,000 were in cities of 100,000 to 500,000 population; 2,210,000 in cities and towns of 10,000 to 100,000; and 6,535,000 in rural districts and towns of less than 10,000 population.

The same figures show that there are 39,538 dealers in automobiles and commercial in the United States. Of these, 2,465 are in cities of 100,000 to 500,000; 7,910 in cities of 10,000 to 100,000; and 25,783 in small towns and rural communities. In other words, nearly two-thirds of all car dealers are located in small towns.

While these figures do not necessarily indicate the volume of business handled by these dealers, it is noted that the distribution of the dealer organization follows very closely that of registered automobiles.

STAR SHOWED 23 M. P. G. ON 8,000 MILE JOURNEY
