STEAMSHIP RUNS WILD

IN HARBOR AT PORTLAND
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 28.—The intercoastal line Vinita yesterday crashed into the river steamer Hercules in Portland harbor, drove the Hercules into the barge M. F., which in turn was hurled into the east approach to the Burnside Street bridge over the Willamette River, wrecking it, and then under the force of its momentum collided with the entire fleet of river boats tied nearby.
The barge M. F., was sunk, lying on the river bottom, but partly out of the water. The Burnside bridge was damaged so that it was closed for traffic. It probably will not be reopened, as a new structure has been authorized and it was to have been closed in another month.
The accident occurred when the Vinita was attempting to berth at the Southern Pacific dock here. A mistake in answering signals in the engine room of the Vinita was said to have been responsible for the crash.

APPROVAL ASKED FOR IRRIGATION

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 27.—The North Canal company, through Oswald West, today asked the state irrigation securities commission to approve a contract entered into between the company and settlers in the Powell Butte irrigation district, involving water for irrigation purposes.
The North Canal company, under the provisions of the contract, has offered to allow the Powell Butte district to complete a partly constructed dam in the Deschutes district and appropriate for irrigation purposes all stored water with the exception of 31,000 acre-feet. For this consideration the North Canal company asks \$60,000 or will accept the bonds of the district at 85 cents on the dollar.
It was estimated that water will be available for the irrigation of 11,500 acres in the Powell Butte district, exclusive of that reserved by the North Canal company.
The commission today also considered guaranteeing interest for a period of five years on \$350,000 of bonds authorized by the Jordan Valley irrigation district. This district has voted a total of \$700,000, which it was estimated will be necessary to complete the project.
The commission will pass on both the contract submitted by the North Canal company and the request of the Jordan Valley irrigation district on August 29.

The Hen is our great American Bird
(Fresh Eggs)
(National Crop Improvement Service)
THE eagle may scream and the turkey strut, but when the year returns on the production of poultry and eggs are compiled, the modest hen is far out in the lead, looking with a scornful eye at the totals of the boastful "kings"—wheat, corn and cotton.
The three fundamentals of clean food, clean quarters and clean, sterile water apply all the way from the whole cycle of poultry life. Clean, sterile water is of paramount importance. All the hens drink from the same vessel, and one sick one can spread infection through the drinking water to the entire flock. The pans should be cleaned each day. According to the dept. of veterinary science, Purdue university, during outbreaks of diseases, or as prevention, the use of copper sulphate or blue stone is valuable. Make up a stock solution by dissolving one-fourth pound of bluestone in one gallon of hot water. Keep this stock solution in a glass or earthenware vessel, as it corrodes metal. Add one-fourth pint of the above solution to each gallon of drinking water placed before the fowls.
