Pennsylvania Governor To Present Plans For Arbitration

STRIKE CALLED TO

Expect that 155,000 Men Will Quit Work Unless here yesterday. Problem Is Solved Soon By Conference Held At Harrisburg.

HARRISBURG, Penn., Aug. 29.—Gifford Pinchot, governor of Pennsylvania and mediator in the present coal crisis faces his supreme test today as the crisis of the situation will be reached in school this afternoon's conference being held here between the representatives of the miners and the operamines.

Plans to Be Submitted

The governor plans to sabait to the warring operators and miners today a plan by which he hopes to bring about a settlement and if it is assured that the miners will continue work in the anthracite fields.

Thousand to Stop Work

Repudiation of the plans which Pinchot is to give the miners today will mean that 155,000 miners will lay down tehir picks at midnight Friday and will walk off the works, thus precipitating what is expected to be the worst fuel famine in the history of the na-

Many Arbitrate Question

The best available information to be secured today from officials in close connection with the affair indicated that Pinchot intends to present a plan of arbitration to the parties in the trouble to insure the continuance of the mine work till a final setthement of the trouble is forth-

cow testing association especially well adapted to dairy districts it is the idea of the Russian lead having numerous small herds has ers to avert such a situation if been projected in Linn county under the leadership of C. A. Heyman, county agent.

From 1600 to 1800 cows can be handled by one tester regardless of the number of herds. Ii. has not been possible heretofore to handle more than 26 to 35 herds, regardless of the number of cows. With small herds the cost per cow for testing has been prohibitive, so there are no cow testing associations in the Willamette valley and some other dairy districts.

"This new type has been used satisfactorily in Whatcomb county, Washington for months," says N. C. Jamison, dai-ry specialist for the college extension service. "Members are grouped in routes of about 200 cows each. The tester goes out one day on a route and leaves sample bottles with members, who take their own samples for one day and at the same time make a record of weights of feed used that day. These are gathered up by the tester the following day and taken to a central laboratory for testing, each member being sent at once a statement of the test of his cows. On the next visit each members is given an up-to-date record for each of his cows showing what they produced, the feed consum- for every miner in southern Oreed, the amount and value of production and the quantity and
