NATRON CUT OFF WORK IS RUSHED

PORTLAND, Sept. 1.—Preliminary work is being completed as rapidly as possible preparatory to the starting of actual construction of the new line through Klamath Falls to Oakridge in Oregon, known as the Natron Cut-off, is providing a second route between San Francisco and Portland.

This project entails about 118 miles of construction work through a scenic and practically virgin section of Oregon. It will cost in the neighborhood of \$15,000,000.

In order to carry the traffic Klamath Falls and over the Natron Cut-off it will be necessary to expend about \$5,000,000 in new construction work from Black Butte Summit to Grass Lake, south of Klamath Falls.

In the Imperial Valley of California, 21.7 miles of new line, are being constructed from Calipatria east and south to a point near Holiville, and as previously announced, extensions of line totaling 23.42 miles are being added in Kern County, Calif.

At Rocky Point, near Metz, on the Coast Line, a new 1275 ft. tunnel is being built at a cost of \$200,000. This will eliminate curves and permit additional speed.

Yard limits are being extended and main track re-arranged at Nutglade near Dunsmuir, at a cost of \$110,000. This marks the beginning of a large yard at this point. A line change of more than one-half mile is being made near Mot, California, on the Shasta Division, eliminating the Big Canyon trestle which is 615 ft long and 104 ft high. This work will cost \$135,000 and will give a permanent roadbed in place of this trestle.
