SACRAMENTO HAS CHECKING BUREAU

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Sept. 5.—As a means of alleviating vehicle congestion in the shopping district and making shopping or pleasure trips of the ranchers in this vicinity more enjoyable, the fruit and agricultural department of the Sacramento Chamber of Commerce today inaugurated a free checking service at its building on Seventh street, between I and J streets. Merchants of the city are heartily co-operating in the novel plan.

Commencing today, out-of-town shoppers can direct their purchases sent to the checking room at the Chamber of Commerce. They will be given checks, upon the presentation of which, at the end of their shopping tour they can collect all their purchases at the Chamber Building. This avoids trying to park near the different stores they visit. The checking room is in charge of an attendant, who will carry the assembled parcels out to the car. It will be open until 6:30 p. m. each week day.

The only other city in the United States having a Chamber of Commerce free checking station is Phoenix, Arizona, where the idea originated four years ago.

NEW FILTRATION PLANT INSTALLED

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Sept. 5.—Sacramento's \$3,000,000 Filtration Plant—now nearing completion will be thrown open for the inspection of the 1,000 delegates and their wives expected here October 10th to 13th for the annual convention of the California Real Estate Association. The filtration plant will be opened late in October and the visit of the realty men will come just at a time when the first testing of the huge 25,000,000 gallon pumps will be held.
