 SACRAMENTO, Sept. 7.—Practically every city in California having a real estate board or a real estate broker will be represented at the coming annual state convention of the California Real Estate Association which meets here October 10th to 13th. This is indicated in reports received this week by telegram by E. J. Morrison, chairman of the general convention, which show that representative attendance is made by a minimum attendance of 1,000. Applying to quite an extent, only thirty of the 104 state boards gave their conservative estimate a total of 743 delegates. The Sacramento Realtors Association is prepared to entertain for 1,000 up.  
 The telegrams were read this week at which Glean D. William, state secretary, and representative of the real estate boards of Lodi, Chico and Woodland were present, together with the local realty board and the Realty Salesmen of Sacramento. William declared the plans for entertaining the visitors as outlined at this meeting gave promise of being the most elaborate and complete of any convention ever held.

**LOGGED OFF LAND NOT AGRICULTURAL**  
 OREGON, Sept. 7.—The amount that all cut or burned-over forest land, or even the greater part of it, is being taken by agriculture is not borne out by the facts. The Portland office of the Forest Service, United States Department of Agriculture, gives the following estimates: The amount of forest land cut over during the year of Washington at 180,000 acres and 100,000 acres in Oregon. It is also estimated that not over 2% of Washington's cut-over area is being put into agriculture and less than 1% of that in Oregon.  
 For the entire United States the total of forest land already burned over, exclusive of railroad and agricultural use has not been grown to 150,000,000 acres says the department. Furthermore, our forest lands being cut over at the rate of about 10,000,000 acres yearly, and probably more than half this area is in virgin forest.  
 The depletion of our timber supplies and the reduction of our forest area largely through timber mining has created a real problem, that of providing the timber necessary to meet our future requirements. Inability to utilize cut-over forest lands for agriculture has created a second and related problem that of land use.  
 Three outstanding measures are necessary to bring about the growing of timber crops on forest lands. One is to stop unrestricted forest exploitation, another to reduce the waste in the use of timber, and the third is to increase timber production to the full capacity of the land.

**AIR DISARMAMENT CONFERENCE URGED**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—The American Legion plans to ask President Coolidge to call an international air disarmament conference in Washington soon to halt the mad race for supremacy in military airships and airplanes now in progress among the countries of Europe.  
 France has taken the lead in this conflict which threatens the peace of the world today. She has 140 squadrons of military flying machines and intends to have 220 squadrons by the end of 1925. Included in the armament are planes which carry 75-millimeter cannons, planes which can transport six machine guns and their crews, enormous bombers, special fighting ships armored with battleship steel and actual troop-ships of the air.  
 England is France's nearest competitor and in response to suggestions of its strategists, has voted an extra \$27,500,000 to enlarge its air armada. It has been estimated, however, that even by 1926 England will be able to send aloft only 624 battle-machines to meet 1,530 that France will have ready. The creation of a separate air force by Italy, with extensive plans for its rapid development into a powerful fighting machine indicates that Italy will enter the race. Russia is employing German technicians and is using German machinery to advance toward its air goal announced by Moscow as 10,000 planes.  
 The American Legion, composed of men who know what war is, feels that action should be taken at once to stop this conflict which menaces the peace of the world before the United States is compelled to expend millions of dollars for planes and equipment.  
 The proposed conference has been endorsed by Senators Lodge, Capper, Dial, Fletcher, numerous congressmen and other prominent citizens, irrespective of party lines.
