50 Miles of Brass Pipe Used in Newest of America's Hotel Palaces

\$8,000,000 Structure To Be Formally Opened on Oct. 1.

The newest palatial hotel in America, a land of beautiful and sumptuous hotels, will be opened on October 1st at Los Angeles, Cal. and will put a period, for the time at

least, to this form of building construction. It is built of brick, and steel, and concrete, and brass and copper—built to last.

The days when western hotels were Mexican trail taverns with patios and corals has passed. And the later days when they were ramshackle structures for occasional tourists and drunks has gone also.

The new Biltmore, now nearly completed, is in the heart of the city and represents an outlay of more than \$8,000,000. There are over 1,000 rooms, each with bath which, in addition to the kitchen and laundry equipment, necessitates the use of 50 miles of brass piping, for the new hotel is built for permanence as well as for beauty, and the owners have no intention of renewing the plumbing every few years.

The architecture is of Renaissance period making use of the Spanish, Italian and French forms and colors.

The exterior of the building is particularly pleasing because of a great cornice of antiqued copper, giving a pleasant finish to the sky line of the building, as well as making repairs and renewals unnecessary because of the ever lasting permanence of its material.

Another feature of the hotel is the installation of immense fans in drums on the roof like the ventilators on an ocean steamship.

The new hotel has Pershing Square, a beautiful park with a fountain, in its front yard and is at the terminus of the new Los Angeles subway.

BIG FAIR PLANNED BY SISKIYOU COUNTY

YREKA, Sept. 11.—Everything is in readiness for the Siskiyou county fair which will be held at Yreka Thursday, Friday and Saturday, September 20, 21 and 22, and that it will eclipse all former events is assured by the board of directors who have closed the details for the biggest and most varied line of attractions ever offered.

The latest attraction secured is California's greatest rodeo organization. Beauford Clark's famous string of bucking horses have been entered—the kind that makes all of the boys "pull leather." Daily performances will be given and will include bulldozing, bronc riding, pony express, Roman riding, wild cow milking, steer roping, bulldozing and every other difficult stunt known to the cowboy. Clark is bringing his full array of horses and will have a herd of wild cattle for roping, bulldozing and milking.

Final arrangements for an auto show in connection with the fair have been completed. It will be held in a large canvas pavilion and will include all the new models of every make of car sold in Siskiyou county. Space has been requested by practically every automobile, truck tractor and accessory dealer in the county.

Clark will bring a bevy of famous cowboy riders and ropers and the following unscratched broncs; Lightning, Whirlwind, Blue Blazes, Wild Cat, Sky Rocket, Monarch, Scar Face, Osgood, Little Beauty. Rambling Sam, Bald Hornet, Bally Down and Blue Devil.

Riders and others interested in the rodeo are familiar with most of the horses mentioned, but there is one that is known from Mexico to Canada, and as far east as Glendive Montana, and that horse is Lightning

Beauford Clark has the distinction of being the only man who has ever been able to stick to Lightning's back, and the only reason Clark sticks is because he and Lightning are pals, and the horse just won't buck with him. Lightning has thrown more good riders than any horse living.

The rodeo program is the most elaborate of its kind ever offered here, featured as it is with a pony express riding contest, wild cow milking, steer roping, bulldozing and every other difficult stunt known to the cowboy. Clark is bringing his full array of horses and will have a herd of wild cattle for roping, bulldozing and milking.

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Last year's automobile show was one of the big attractions of the fair, but this year's show promises to be much better. There will be all kinds of demonstrations to show the merits of the different makes of cars, and tests to show the quality of tires and other auto accessories.

"Blue Man" had Heart and Brain of Indigo

POLES GOING UP FOR NEW TRANSMISSION LINE MONTAGUE, Cal., Sept. 11.—The pole gang of the California-Oregon Power company is now near Montague erecting the poles for the new transmission line of the company, extending from Copco to Yreka.
