24,500 SACKS OF RICE TO GO TO JAPAN FROM COLUSA

COLUSA, CAL., Sept. 13.—Rice is leaving the local mill at the rate of seven cars a day to be shipped to Japan. Each car contains 700 bags. This will continue until thirty-five cars have been shipped, making a total of 24,500 sacks. The Western Pacific and Sacramento Northern railroads are carrying the consignment free of charge as their share toward getting the rice to the Japanese suffers.

SAN DIEGO, CAL., Sept. 13.—The report that at least ten destroyers, instead of seven went on the rocks of the Point Arguello gained credence when it was learned that the Farragut and Somers are leaking from holes in their hulls. The Marcus also has a rent in the bottom and for repairs. Information has been withheld by navy officials of the greatest disaster in the history of the American navy. The naval board inquiry to probe the disaster convened shortly before noon with several indications that it will last several days.

PORTLAND, ORE., Sept. 13.—The earnings of the north-western railroads during the first six months of 1933 netted but 2 percent on the property valuation of the lines, according to Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern, who addressed the fifth annual convention of the Ticket Agents which opened here today. Efforts of the roads to alleviate the distress of the farmers of the north-western states was held responsible for the low earnings. More than a thousand delegates are here.

PORTLAND, ORE., Sept. 13.—Prize-fighting is the shame of the nation, says Dr. Clarence Wilson, of Washington, D. C. here attending the Oregon Conference of the Methodist Church. Dr. Wilson was elected a delegate on the first ballot to a general conference at Springfield, Mass., next May. Four others are to be elected. A second ballot is necessary as the next highest did not have sufficient votes to elect.

DES MOINES, IA., Sp. 13.—The Standard Oil Company of Iowa, through offices here, announced a price cut of two cents a gallon for gasoline, thus making the price 14 1/2 cents a gallon. The Independent companies immediately followed suit.

MITCHELL FIELD, N. Y. Sept. 13.—Lieutenant Brown, a navy aviator, piloting a Curtiss bi-plane, in preparation for the airplane race at St. Louis, established a new world's speed record of 245 miles an hour. The previous record was held by Lieutenant Sanderson of the Marines with 238 miles an hour.

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., Sept. 13.—Mayor Hyman of New York is ill here with pleuro-pneumonia. He took a turn for the worse and is gravely ill. Pleurisy has developed in the left lung. The Mayor has been suffering more than a week with pleuro-pneumonia of the right lung.

UNITED STATES USES GREAT QUANTITY WOOD

SALEM, Sept. 13.—The United States uses more wood than any other country. In fact the consumption in this country equals about two-fifths of the entire consumption of the world, or, expressed in round figures, about 22 1-2 billion cubic feet, declared the Portland office of the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The per capita consumption of this country is 212 cubic feet, of which 110 cubic feet, or a little more than half is saw timber, and the balance consists of cordwood, continues the department's report, which was recently printed for public distribution. Including the losses by fire, insects, and disease, the total drain on the country's forests is close to 25 billion feet. At the present time this country is growing only about 6 billion cubic feet. However, according to the data contained in the report, if the entire forest area of the country—some 470,000,000 acres—were placed under intensive forestry about 27 billion cubic feet of timber could ultimately be produced each year. This amount would exceed the present drain on our forests by a relatively small margin.

COMMERCE DEPARTMENT ISSUES GUIDE MANUAL

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 13.—A guide book designed for the prospective small home owner was issued yesterday by the United States Government, the Department of Commerce announcing the publication of a handbook setting forth details which assert the steps necessary to acquire such property.

This aid to home builders is a publication entitled, "How to Own Your Home." It carries a foreword by Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, and was compiled by John M. Gries and James S. Taylor, of the Division of Building and Housing, in answer to the request of a large number of national civic organizations that the subject should be authoritatively covered to encourage home owning in the interest of good citizenship. The booklet, planned to give simple, common-sense information to the person of moderate means who would possess a home, is the result of collaboration and approval by more than fifty civic bodies and experts interested in developing a sound social and economic system through the home.

In declaring that the public recognizes the advantage of owning their own homes and that business groups, especially, are viewing this proposition in a new light, Secretary Hoover said in the foreword:

"They see that taking a neighborhood interest in developing sound financing and other machinery for the use of home seekers and insisting on the observance of honest straight-forward business methods by those who deal with home seekers is not paternalism but good business and good citizenship. It is the square deal—and it is not only right but essential that the cards should not be stacked against the home seeker."

"The present large proportion of families that own their homes is both the foundation of a sound economic and social system and a guarantee that our society will continue to develop rationally.

"Buying or building a home requires the use of sound judgment in seeing that the personal needs of the family are best met with the funds available," Mr. Hoover pointed out in the foreword. "It involves not only the carrying on of transactions of financing and buying or building but it involves the proper determination of location with respect to school, to work, and to neighborhood."

Secretary Hoover stated that the development of the automobile has given "a great impulse to suburban life and an increasing possibility of home ownership."

"A family that owns its own home takes pride in it, maintains it better, gets more pleasure out of it, and has a more wholesome, healthful, and happier atmosphere in which to bring up children.

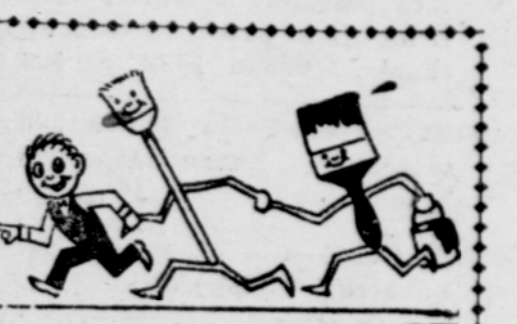
MOTORIST WHO IGNORED LAW GOES TO JAIL
