For Those Who Appear

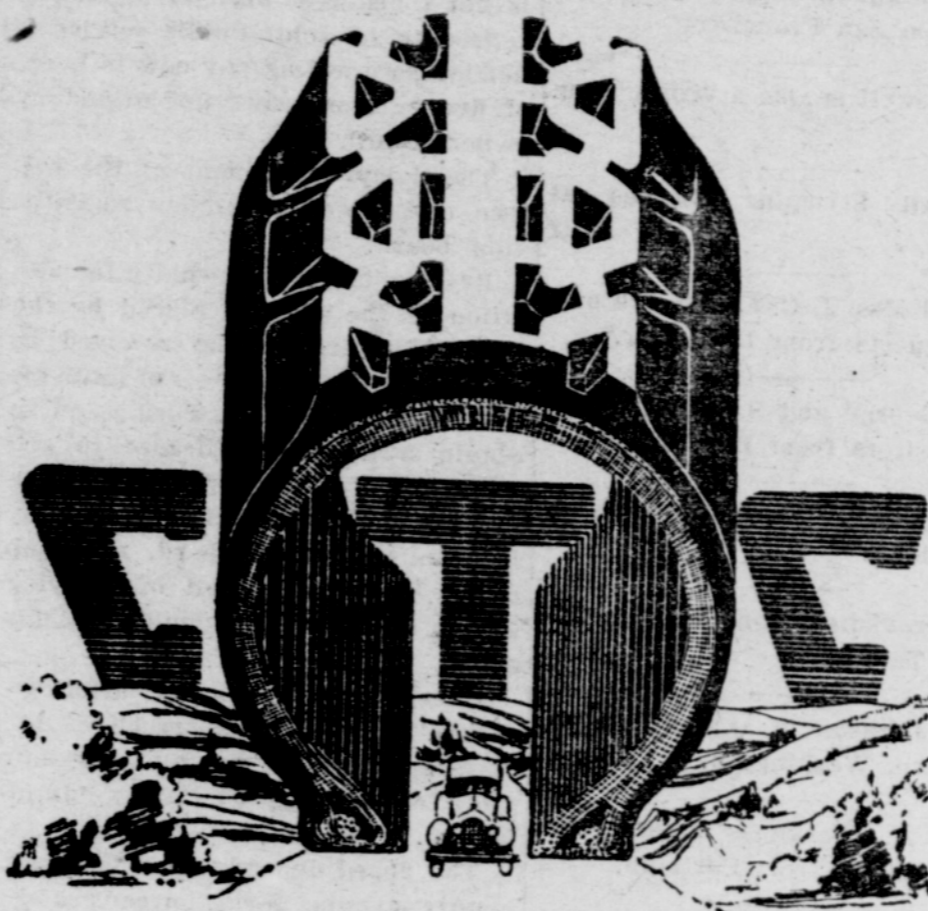

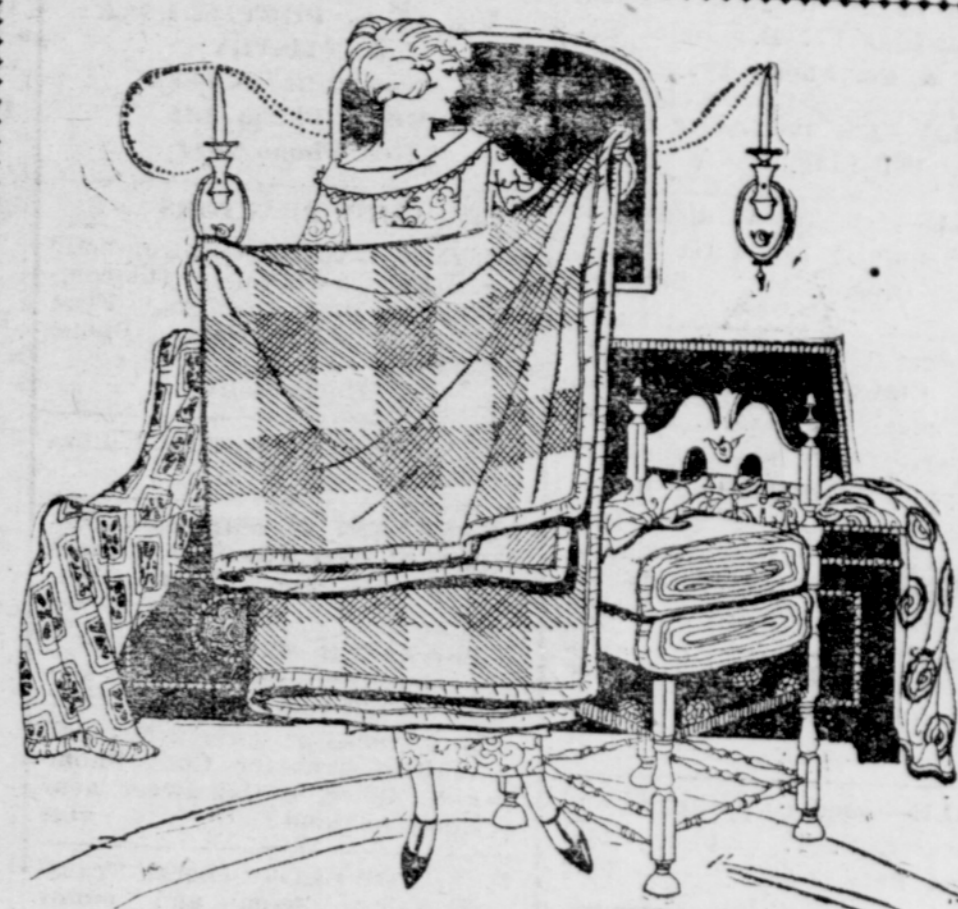
