VALUE OF AUSTRIAN MARK NOW VERY LOW

Austria is no longer the "paradise" of German vacationers. The crown, for years the "poor relation" of the German mark, is now stabilized, while the mark keeps on in its fatal plunge.

Yet, stabilization, which is the direct result of the American loan that put Austria back on its feet, has not served as a check to the steady upward trend of prices in Austria. The cost of living is mounting from day to day. If Austrians want to get any benefit from their money they go to Germany, just as a year ago—and even six months ago—Germans came to Austria to spend their marks.

At Bad Gastein, the fashionable summer resort, one day costs—for a modest tourist—300,000 Austrian crowns. That is, at the present rate of exchange, forty-five million marks, or approximately \$40. Thus Austria, a year ago the cheapest country in Europe, has become the most expensive.

ENORMOUS QUANTITIES OF ELECTRICITY USED

Los Angeles, Sept. 19—The total annual capacity of the hydro-electric generating stations of the eight leading countries of the world is about 20,000,000 horse power according to Benjamin E. Jones, hydraulic engineer of the United States Geological Survey. In this field of power production the United States heads the list with a total production per year of over half the entire amount. If additional hydro-electric plants are put in operation in the United States at the same rate as they have been since 1920, by 1930 this type of electric current production will be providing the nation with 14,000,000 horse power annually. Canada, Japan and Europe have all been making rapid progress in this method of producing electricity by water power. In Canada alone the increase in capacity of hydro-electric plants for 1922 was 500,000 horse power.

Speedy British Plane

Enters Schneider Race
London, Sept. 20.—Great Britain's entrant for the Schneider Cup race, the Napier Supermarine Sea Lion, which won the race for her at Naples last year, has been at Cowes, Isle of Wight, on September 27.

Her potential speed has been increased to 160 miles per hour, her wing span reduced from 30 feet to 24 feet, and her engine increased to 450 horse-power.

Her chances, however, are not regarded very favorably in view of the keen United States competition.

SUBSTITUTE WANTED FOR "DIAMOND DICK"

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Is there a modern and acceptable substitute for the "Deadwood Dick" tales, the "Injun" stories, the blood-and-thunder paper-backs of a generation ago that will be acceptable to both grown up censors and boy readers? Can the writers of best sellers, backed by modern science and invention, turn out tales that the modern boy will grab and read as eagerly as his grandfather read the lurid but tabooed books and booklets of his day?

These are leading questions to which the Executive Committees in charge of the publications issued by the Boy Scouts of America propose finding a direct answer. This inquiry has been made possible as a result of a \$100,000 gift received from an anonymous source. This fund is to be used initially in developing a wider range of contributions to Boys' Life, the monthly magazine published by the Boy Scouts of America for all boys.

This \$100,000 contribution represents a protest against the idea entertained in many quarters that innocuous potboilers are the sort of articles that boys should read. The fund will be used in placing at the disposal of the boy reader a portion of the talent now almost exclusively employed in writing for magazines that are supposedly gotten out for mature readers.

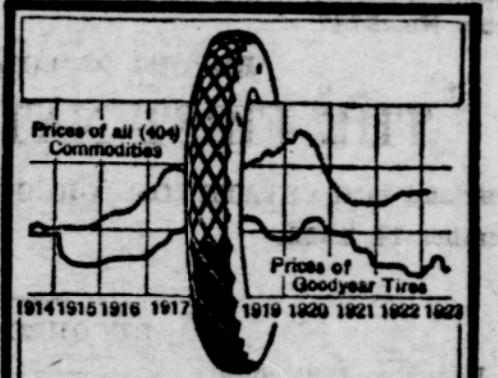

SEALED PROPOSALS will be received by the Common Council of the City of Ashland, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock P. M., Tuesday, Oct. 2nd, 1923, at the Recorder's Office in the City Hall, and such proposals will be opened and considered the same day and date at 8 o'clock P. M., for the construction and installation of a sewer in Sewer District No. 26, all pipe and material to be furnished by the Contractor.

Said sewer is to be built from the terminus of the present sewer on Lincoln Street south along Lincoln Street to the center of Iowa Street; thence westerly along Iowa Street approximately three hundred seventy feet, also from Iowa Street south on Palm Ave, approximately four hundred ninety feet, according to the plans and specifications on file in the office of the City Recorder.

CAMP LEWIS MAY BECOME PERMANENT AIR BASE

TACOMA, Sept. 19.—Rebuilding of Camp Lewis with permanent barracks and establishment of an army air base at the post within the near future, was predicted here yesterday by Major General Charles A. Morton, commander of the ninth corps area, who is here on his annual trip of inspection. General Morton said that he has recommended that concrete or brick buildings be erected at Camp Lewis and that he will confer with Brigadier General Robert Alexander, commander of the post, on plans to be submitted to the war department.

The entire personnel of the army post passed in review before the general during the day. General Morton expects to remain in the Northwest for the remainder of the week on army business.
