**AIR DISARMAMENT TO BE DISCUSSED**

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 20.—The proposal of an international air disarmament conference will be one of the principal issues discussed at the American Legion national convention in San Francisco, October 15-19. It is believed by national officers of that organization in Indianapolis. Within the last few weeks the proposed meeting in Washington to halt the international race for military air superiority has been discussed at a number of state convention of the legion and resolutions have been adopted recommending that the national convention authorize a vigorous campaign in behalf of the conference, if President Coolidge has not announced his decision to hold it before the national convention dates, October 15-19. This movement was sponsored at the recent convention of the Pennsylvania department of the legion by Franklin D'Olier, past national commander.

Public sentiment favors the proposed conference, according to Lemuel Bolles, Legion national Adjutant, who has announced the results of the first three weeks of a national poll the organization has undertaken. From a total of 335 replies received from United States senators, representatives, governors, newspaper editors, college presidents, and other prominent citizens, 303 letter have expressed approval of the gathering, five qualified approval, ten were undecided and only seventeen were against the proposal. The poll was answered by twenty-one United States senators, seventy-six representatives, fourteen governors, 158 newspaper editors, thirty-five college presidents and thirty-one private individuals, including a number of authorities on international questions.

**CHAMPIONSHIP GAME TO BE AT REDDING**

WEAVERVILLE, Calif., Sept. 20.—The game of baseball between Susanville and the Weaverville Highways for \$500 a side will be played in Redding on September 30th.

This agreement was closed here yesterday between A. G. Breitwieser of Susanville, manager of the Susanville team, and Theodore Voss of Weaverville, manager of the Highways.

Both managers wanted the game for their respective home towns, but a compromise was reached by billing the game for neutral ground in Redding. The stakes of \$500 a side were put up in cash.

Redding promises that the gate receipts will be \$500. All the receipts will go to the winning team. So the visitors will really draw down \$1000. It will be the greatest non-league game of the ball ever played in the northern part of the state. Redding will have the greatest crowd ever seen in its baseball park, for Trinity County will turn out in force, backing the Highways. This game will be for the real championship. Susanville and the Highways are both flushed with victories won against great odds throughout the season.

In giving out the lineup the Highways, Manager Voss says man and money cannot change it. Here is the lineup: Pitcher, Williams; catcher, Wilder; first base, Thompson; second, Richard; third, Mahoney; short, Merritt; left field, Kelly; right, Davis; center, Ott.

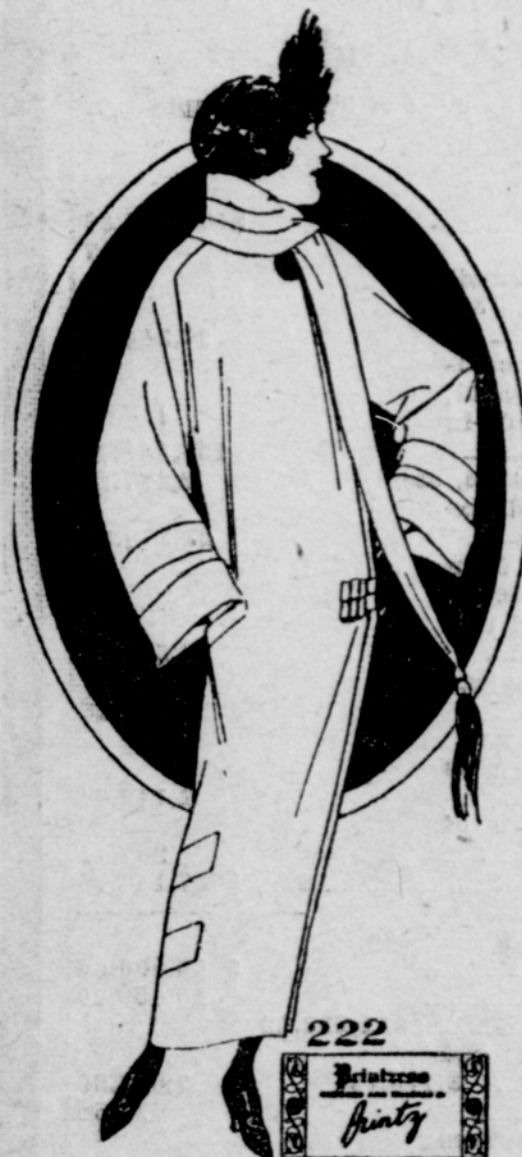
