#### EGGS USED FOR TICKETS IN HUNGARIAN THEATRES

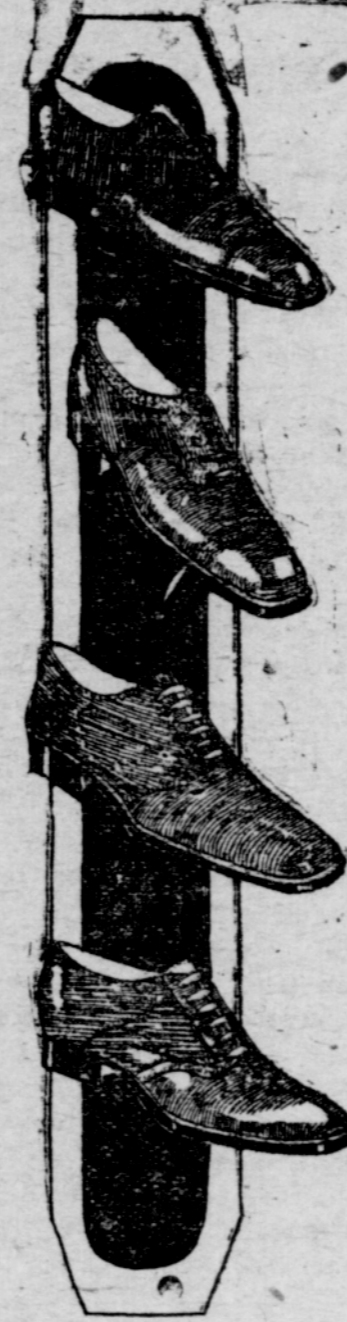
PARIS, Aug. 20.—Theaters of Szolnok, a Hungarian city, are charging
