If there were no other consideration than this, it would be sufficient to make it imperative that the United States government prove to all the people the full strength of the law. No consideration whatsoever can excuse tolerance, nothing can warrant procrastination. The law is written, and the law is the people. Destroy one and both perish. With sanity and courage, the complete test must be made. The law must be given expression with all the force at the command of the nation. Then if with its whole strength, the law remains unfulfilled, the people can reflect.

CHICAGO, Sept. 24.—Chicago, in its feverish quest for privacy, is leading its life in booths more every day.

Besides the thousands of telephone booths all over the city and the hundreds that one finds in the many Chinese restaurants, booths in a downtown repair shop that cobbles your shoes while you wait are the newest things.

They do not hide the patron entirely, coming only waist-high. Girls with shapely ankles that might attract too much attention and gentlemen with socks that someone forgot to darn may wait here in peace and comfort without having their modesty shocked.

Each cubby-hole is equipped with a deep, comfortable young chair. An attendant removes the shoes for the patron, then shoves a comfortable cushion beneath his feet. There is a small swinging door to each booth. Newspapers and magazines are furnished.

The management's idea has not proved so bad. Its business has increased to such an extent that the wait under any other circumstances might become tedious. But, as it is, there is so much comfort during the wait that one really is dismayed when one's shoes are returned neatly repaired.

This is perhaps the most elaborate shoe repairing shop in the country. It is a wonderful array of brass, mahogany, plate glass and that thing so dear to the American heart, service.

There are a few mending machines at the front window that serve to draw crowds which at times compare favorably with those clustered about small neighborhood bulletin boards relaying world's series results.

But the principal mechanical work is done in a compartment enclosed in plate glass partitions, so the noise, dust and smells do not reach the customers. At the same time patrons may watch the work from their comfortable gallery. The work room resembles a conservatory or the glass enclosed bridge of a great liner.

There is a shoe-shining stand operated in the fore part of the establishment. It is kept as clean as the White House kitchen. Polished brass gleams everywhere. Neatly dressed negroes do the polishing and brushing under shaded lights that make the customer think he's in a laboratory.

After a trip to this place one is truly sorry that shoe soles don't wear through faster.

MARATHAN RUNNER IS LEGION MEMBER

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 24.—A crack marathon runner from the eastern coast is to be a full fledged delegate to the American Legion convention in San Francisco, October 15 to 19. Clarence H. De Mar, of Melrose, Mass., winner of many honors over the long distance, is the legion man, and will be seen in connection with some of the athletic events held during the legion's stay in the Golden Gate city.

De Mar captured the annual marathon race of the Boston Athletic Association last April, and drew permanent possession of the club trophy, having won it three times. He was a contender at the Stockholm Olympic games in 1912, as a member of the United States' team, and is in active training for the Paris games of 1924, where he expects to enter in the Marathon event. In addition to his athletic accomplishments, De Mar is an active legion worker, and has successfully organized and directed Boy Scout troops and other boy's work in Massachusetts.

MEDICAL CONCLAVE TO BE HELD IN ROME

Chicago, Sept. 22.—A conclave of prominent medical men and surgeons from virtually every nation in the world will be held in Rome October 7 and will continue until October 14, according to Dr. Max Thorek, prominent Chicago surgeon, who departed from the Italian capital recently. The meeting will be known as the International Congress of Physicians and Surgeons, and leading medical practitioners and instructors from England, France, Italy, Belgium, Japan, China, Greece, Mexico, South Africa and North and South America will attend.

Dr. Thorek will address the assemblage October 8 and will devote himself to a discourse on gland trans-plantation—a topic which physicians assert is engrossing the attention of hundreds of thousands of persons at this time. His subject will be: "My Four Years' Experience in Gland Transplantation."

While Dr. Thorek refused to discuss what his revelations will be next month, it is generally believed he intends to prove or disprove the theory that humanity is benefited by interstitial glandular operations. The physician said his reticence to discuss details relative to such operations was prompted by the ethics of his profession.

Dr. Thorek received an appointment as honorary president of the congress some time ago. He also has been invited to speak before the Royal Academy of Medicine and Surgery at Rome, and has made tentative arrangements to conduct clinics in several European cities while abroad.

FRANCE TO HAVE PLENTY OF COAL THIS WINTER

Paris, Sept. 22.—Thanks to the Ruhr occupation and French administration of the Saar Valley, France will not lack coal this winter.

The Saar will furnish approximately 1,000,000 tons more coal this year than France realized last year, while the Ruhr mines insure almost a million dollars a month.

Consumers will pay from 75 to 100 francs (\$5 to \$7) per ton for the fuel.
