CALIFORNIA WILL IMPROVE HIGHWAY

(Continued from Page 1)
The Yreka-Gazelle unit of seven-teen miles is being graded and gravel surfaced at the present time by a Portland contractor. A thirty foot grade is being established on this unit. The original contract, which was let by the former commission, called for paving with a penetration method of asphalt surface, but the contract was modified by mutual agreement, and a gravel surface will be laid on the road at this time with a heavier type of pavement in contemplation at some later date.

From a few miles south of Gazelle through the Sisson and Weed section and as far south as Duns-muir, twenty miles of concrete paving have been completed. It is eighteen feet wide and is in good condition, a portion only recently having been opened to travel.

Sacramento Canyon Problem
From Dunsuir to Redding sixty-five miles, is the most difficult road problem with which the commission is confronted in the entire state at present. This is true because detours are practically impossible and whatever new work is undertaken must be done and the highway kept open for travel at the same time.

State Engineer, T. E. Stanton has just returned from the north where he conferred with the division engineer regarding studies of this unit which have been under way during recent months.

Fourteen Miles Of New Road
It is probable that fourteen miles of the highway between Redding and Dunsuir will be relocated in its entirety, the present route being abandoned altogether. This will be done because a better alignment and grade can be secured at a cost not greatly in excess of the cost of widening the present grade.

Work will be undertaken here similar to that which will be under way soon between the state line and hornbrook. A realignment of the road will be worked out which will widen the highway, eliminate as many of the curves as possible, and provide a thirty-foot grade practically the entire distance.

It also will shorten somewhat the distance between Redding and Dunsuir and will make construction possible without interference with travel on the present highway.

Detailed plans for this work will be completed as soon as possible so that bids may be called for at an early date.

Daily News Letter

PRAGUE, Sept. 26—The animosity between Germans and Czechs in Bohemia—as it was then called—used to be a popular topic in pre-war times. It is only natural that a hatred which dates back many centuries cannot be eliminated by simply creating a democratic form of government.

Before the war the Germans, who had behind them the Austrian governmental authorities and the German reigning House of Hapsburg, were quite powerful in Prague, the capital of Bohemia. Besides the fact that they represented the intellectual middle class and the military, they also cut a figure in university life. They claimed that Prague University was the oldest German university in the world; owing to the fact that the educational standards were maintained at a very high level students from all parts of the German speaking world flocked to Prague to spend at least one semester at this famous college. Studying at the German section of Prague University was not without danger for the students. The display of brilliant, colorful social life of the German students, as has been portrayed so vividly in the play "Alt Heidelberg," was considered a constant provocation by the Czech students, as well as by the Czech population of the city, which, after all, were greatly in the majority. The consequences were many cases of friction and at times even street fights.

As a matter of course, when on October 28, 1918, their leaders succeeded in establishing the Czechoslovak Republic the people, who for centuries had considered themselves oppressed by a German Emperor, felt a strong desire to turn around and take revenge on the Germans. But these outbursts occurred only in the hour of intoxication by victory and were not sanctioned or even tolerated by the Government in any way. What the Czechoslovak Government really

The Czechs had always considered the Austrians as usurpers of power. Therefore they did not recognize the right of the Hapsburg dynasty to govern them, but only submitted to force. Neither did they agree with the German students in their claim that Prague University was founded as a German school. The language in which lectures were given in those days was Latin, and the fact that Germans used to enroll there did not make it a German institution. They said that Bohemia, Moravia, and Silesia were really Czech and unjustly annexed by the hereditary foe, Austria. They proved by manifold evidence that they had their own culture and history.

ed guaranteeing the minorities certain rights, such as public schools, etc., in district where they amounted to at least 20 per cent of the population. The Germans probably still have much cause for complaint. But every-thing is being done to bring about an understanding.

The people love arts and sports and are constantly meeting upon these neutral grounds. As the Czechoslovak President, Prof. Masaryk, and his faithful aid, Dr. Benesh, have prophesied, much of the antagonism seems to be disappearing as time passes.

Prosperity is one of the best remedies for dissatisfaction in general. The Germans, as well as the Czechs, in this republic are enjoying a stabilized rate of exchange, and there ment.

It seems as if art, sports and economics will form the bridge to mutual understanding between the Germans and the Czechs in Czechoslovakia.
