Japanese Editors Poorly Paid. Japanese newspaper men work for small salaries, but efforts are being made by prosperous newspapers in Osaka to elevate the standard.

The Osaka Mainichi, which has a daily circulation of about 800,000, has made substantial increase in its existing scale of salaries. Together with a bonus distributed twice a year, actual pay is two to three times the specified salary.

Much False Hair in Anna's Reign.

There were different kinds of wigs for different professions; perukes for the men of law; full bottomed wigs for merchants; long bobs and natty "scratches" for tradesmen and even for coachmen "the curled hair of a water dog." The historian Sydney thus describes the period: "These cumbersome and superfluous articles of attire . . . were certainly not without advantage, seeing that a man of business could easily dispatch his wig to be dressed by a fleur in the next street, while he attended to the transaction of his affairs in his counting house. Wigs assumed all shapes and sizes. To one made very full and curled eighteen inches to the front which was imported from France the name 'Campaign' was applied."
