### Lodge Meeting—

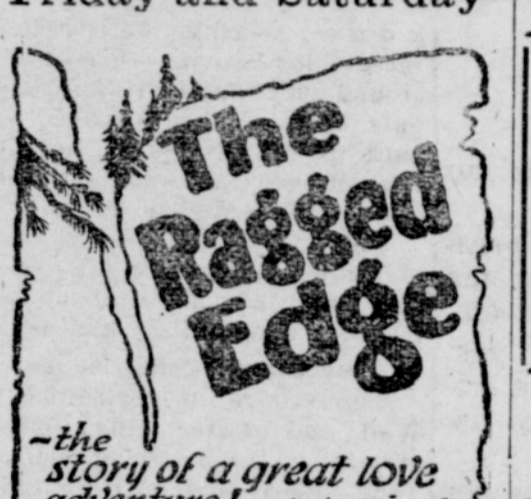
Tonight is the regular stated meeting of the Ashland Masonic lodge. The subject of a building program is expected to be brought to a conclusion at tonight's meeting.
