#### MUCH MINING ACTIVITY REPORTED ON BEAVER CREEK IN SISKIYOU

OAK BAR, Cal., Oct. 11.—J. B. Miller, superintendent of the Beaver Creek Mining Company, reports that he has development work at his company's properties near the confluence of Beaver Creek and the Klamath River so well advanced that he will begin operations with a force of fifty or sixty men in the early spring. Considerable gold is being taken out here at several small properties.

Several placers owned by H. J. Barton are under lease and in several instances good pay dirt is being washed. Considerable prospecting has been done the past summer on Upper Beaver Creek, the principal efforts of the explorers being confined to locating the old stream bed, sought by prospectors for more than sixty years.

#### PUBLIC OPINION

We have little use for the tactics displayed by Governor Walton in Oklahoma during the recent trouble which has directed the attention of the whole nation toward that state. He has flouted both the legislature and the supreme court of his state and by declaring martial law and seeking to prevent elections practically assumed a dictatorship in a democracy. His methods of fighting the Klan are not American. If, as he claims, his impeachment is sought for flimsy reasons, why should not court the fullest investigation by the legislature or any other public body. The highest court in our country, regardless of all assertions and claims to the contrary, is nothing more or less than public opinion when fully informed of the true facts. Governor Walton has every means at his disposal to give these facts to the public through the duly constituted courts and by means of public hearings. The Klan must rise or fall on its own merits. We countenance lawbreaking of no kind, least of all by the governor of a great sovereign state who ought to set a fearless example to his fellow men. It is unthinkable that the Klan or any other organization is stronger than a state or a nation. The backbone of our political system is the right of the majority to rule and Governor Walton and all his followers must abide by this inherent right of the people who elected him. Whenever his official acts will not stand investigation before the bar of Public Opinion, his impeachment will and should naturally follow. No man can flout the right of the people to express their opinions at the polls on public questions, regardless of hairsplitting legal technicalities as to whether or not all the red tape has been unwound in advance, and get away with it. American citizens govern themselves and therefore their first inalienable right is that of going to the polls at any time they are confronted with a crisis, as in Oklahoma. We will go still further and express the opinion that neither executives nor courts can safely set aside elections in times of great public stress. The will of the people is absolutely supreme or we must cease to exist as a self-governing democracy.—Ellensburg, Wash. Gazette.
