min says he started back from the train to flag. After getting off the rear end he turned around quickly to size up the situation in front, as no signal had been given by whistle from the engine. When he turned he saw a man in blue overalls and jumper pulling at wires seemingly near the engine or the water tank. Benjamin says he wondered what was going on, but continued on his way to perform his duty as flagman. He says he probably had gone the distance of seven or eight car lengths when the explosion occurred.

The first man at the front end was Conductor Merrit, in charge of the train. Merrit found Engineer Bates dead on the floor of the cab.
