FAMOUS FRENCH RECIPES

Peach Pudding PARIS, Oct. 12.—The French housewife makes a peach pudding to replace our own peach rop-poly. Choose the ripe but firm fruit. Plunge into boiling water for a few minutes and then peel. Separate into halves and cut slices of bread the same size as the fruit. Place the half of the peach on each slice of bread. Sprinkle plentifully with sugar and dot with large lumps of butter. Bake in a moderate oven and baste often with the syrup. Serve in a large sauce bowl with the juice.
