HEINRICH AIDS IN BANDIT HUNT

Criminologist Supplies Two Figures Chisled from Colts Automatic

Postal Inspectors Arrive to Assist in Man-hunt—Abandoned Hudson Automobile Found

That Prof. Heinrich, well known criminologist with the University of California, of Berkeley, is giving valuable aid in establishing important facts in connection with the holdup of train No. 13 and the murder of four trainmen south of this city last Thursday is the opinion of Dan O'Connell, chief of the force of detectives conducting the man-hunt.

Makes Other Discoveries "Prof. Heinrich has made other valuable detections from his examination of the pair of overalls that one of the bandits discarded immediately after the holdup," said Chief O'Connell.

Postal Chief Arrives Reinforcements were added to the growing army of detectives and special agents with the arrival of Chief Inspector Chas. Riddford yesterday from Spokane.

Guardsmen Assist in Hunt Governor Pierce, from his office at Salem, has instructed Capt. John Q. Adams, Commanding the Fourth Artillery Corps, O. N. G., of this city, to keep a detail of three men on duty to work in conjunction with officials representing the companies most interested in the holdup and quadruple murder.

Hudson Car Is Found Word was received yesterday afternoon from Portland giving the information that officials had found a Hudson car abandoned on a road near Vancouver, Wash. The auto is described as being a seven passenger touring car, body painted blue and wheels and hubs painted red.

Late bulletin from Coquille says: Arthur Covell was permitted to change his plea of "guilty" to "not guilty" by Judge Kendall here today. Covell was brought into court on a cot. The trial is expected to start in two weeks.

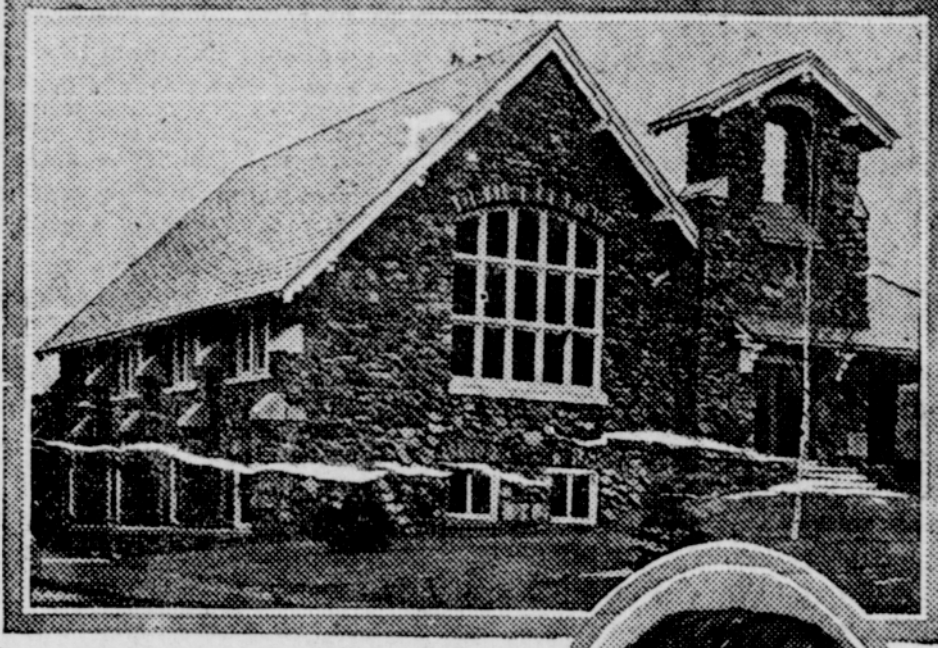

Readers will recall that Gardner held up trains with considerable frequency and starred in several sensational escapes, chief of which was the daring get-away from the federal prison at McNeill's Island. He is now serving time at Leavenworth, Kansas.

SISSON BANK BUYS LOT FOR NEW BANKING STRUCTURE

SISSON, Cal., Oct. 18.—The bank of Mt. Shasta has purchased the lots on Walnut Street, belonging to the Order of Eagles. The Eagles purchased these lots some years ago to build a hall, but they later dropped this idea.

The bank will erect a new building next year. Plans for the building will be worked out this winter, and as soon as the weather permits in the spring work will be started. The bank has been going for seven months, and its assets to-day are over \$300,000.

COUPLE MARRIED A HALF CENTURY

Mr. and Mrs. Day Relate Interesting Experiences of Their Lives.

Both Were Printers—Former Worked in One Office for Period of 36 Years.

Yesterday's Tidings told of the observance by Alpha Chapter No. 1, O. E. S. of the fiftieth wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Day, honored members of that organization. A Tidings representative called yesterday on the distinguished couple and obtained points of interest in the achievement that will be of interest to many friends.

The husband was born of American parents in Chambly, Quebec, in 1851 and now living on two borrowed years above the allotted three score and ten. When a boy he moved with his parents to Vermont, where he learned the printer's trade, and while still a young man he located at Grinnell, Iowa.

36 Years in One Office In connection with his work as a printer, Mr. Day has an enviable record in that he spent an unbroken period of 36 years in the office of the Iowa Herald at Grinnell.

Meets Susan Mason While employed on the Herald Mr. Day met Miss Susan Mason, who was also learning the printer's trade, and after a brief courtship they were married, the ceremony being performed by Thos. Brande, a Baptist clergyman, Oct. 11, 1873.

They worked side by side in the office of the Herald for many years, in fact the husband remained with the Herald until they moved to Ashland in 1907.

Retires From Favorite Trade Following their arrival in Ashland, Mr. Day was employed on the Tidings until 1910, when he decided to forsake, for all time, the "stick" and line gauge of the printer. Having secured a comfortable home, and having saved during their days of productivity, they were enabled to retire from active work and spend the mellow years of their lives in comparative ease.

Mrs. Day the Older Mrs. Day, who was born of Yankee parents in Illinois in 1849, is 75 years of age. Despite her years she is active, enjoys good health and looks forward, as does her husband, to enjoying many years in the whirl of life.

Review Their Achievement In reviewing their married life of half a century they attribute their success to the fact that they practiced true comradeship from the beginning, and that a spirit of helpfulness has ever prevailed. "Breakers have appeared during the fifty years that we have been husband and wife," said Mrs. Day, "but common sense and charity prevailed, with the result that difficulties were successfully surmounted and harmony has triumphed."
