IS MARRIAGE A FAILURE?

The frequency of divorce, the low standard of morals existing in many homes, the apparent slight consideration given marriage vows, the frequent appearing triangle combine to make the average American man and woman ask: "Is marriage a failure?"

Ashland welcomes an event this week that gives a negative answer to the question. Mr. and Mrs. William H. Day, honored residents, are celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding. Through half a century the husband and wife have met the perplexing problems of the matrimonial sea and emerge triumphant, giving the lie to the assertion that marriage is a failure.

At a recent social event the wedding scene of fifty years ago was reenacted. To those who witnessed the happy couple standing side by side, each radiating a smile that indicated joy in their accomplishment, it was a scene that touched the innermost feelings and there was not one but who said: it is not an ordinary accomplishment, it is a real achievement. The event must have recalled to Mr. and Mrs. Day many times in their lives when serious clouds of trouble would have risen to obscure the bright canopy of happiness had not each exercised toward each other the spirit of faith, hope and charity. They are three fundamentals in the successful marriage.

Many marriages are successful that do not extend over the long period of fifty years, for, too often one of the contracting parties is called by a hand of death, bringing to an earthly end that which had been a perfect union. This recalls that the venerable Ashland couple have guarded well their health. Each has borrowed time beyond three score years and ten, and their method of living has been such that there is every assurance that it will be many years before they begin the descent down life's hill to the other side.

They have reached the mellowness of life. Through faith in each other, though exercising charity one toward the other, though hope, they have achieved something that makes life worth living.

The achievement of the Days merits the flood of congratulations pouring in on them.

TIME

It is not time—seconds, minutes, hours, even years—but the use that men make of time that makes the difference in men's fortunes.

Nature is absolutely impartial in the distribution of her hours. She gives to no man time that she does not give to another. The same morning gives every man an equal start with his fellow and the same night finds each another day further on the journey or lost by the wayside.

Too many work-a-day men end work with the eight hours and wish for less, sleep ten hours and crave for more, eat to fullness and leave the table unsatisfied, hope in vain for the "luck in leisure," accept no opportunities to improve mind and body and see not that those who are getting ahead in this life are those for whom every "waking hour" is a "working hour."

Working hours are found for the unwise, but the wise find hours in which to work.

Divorce-Marriage Chain Mixes Things

EVANSTON, ILL.—Divorces do mix things up nowadays, for a fact. Addison Stillwell, president of the Stillwell Lumber company of Chicago, and Mrs. Frances K. Pearsons, divorced wife of Mayor Harry P. Pearsons of Evanston, were quietly married at noon in the home of the bride's father, Rollin A. Keyes, at 1210 Forest avenue, Evanston. The ceremony, which was performed by Rev. R. J. Richards, associate pastor of the First Baptist church of Evanston, was witnessed only by members of the two families.

The wedding adds another link to a chain of marriages and divorces which began with the divorce of Mr. and Mrs. Glidden Osborne five years ago. The first Mrs. Osborne has since been remarried and is living in Washington, D. C. During last August, at Watch Hill, R. I., Mr. Osborne married Mrs. May Peabody Stillwell, a daughter of the late Francis Stuyvesant Peabody, who divorced Addison Stillwell last winter on grounds of desertion.

The Stillwell divorce preceded by only a few weeks that of Mayor Pearsons and his wife. Mrs. Pearsons, charging desertion, set forth that she and her husband had not been living together since 1914, a fact kept secret during the war, when she took a leading part in Red Cross welfare work and went to France with a group of Evanston women.

Upon her return from abroad she did not return to her husband's home, but went to reside with her father, embarking in various business ventures for herself. One of her hobbies was the designing of fancy backs for playing cards. She and Mr. Stillwell were good friends before either of the divorces was granted, and since her separation from her husband the two often had been seen together in public. Rumors of the approaching marriage had been flitting about Evanston for several weeks.

Mrs. Pearsons' marriage followed by just a week that of her daughter Frances to Gwinn Rust in Washington, D. C. The former Miss Pearsons was a student at Vassar, and it is said her parents were not notified of the marriage until after the ceremony had been performed in the cathedral at the capital.

The quiet wedding of Mr. Stillwell and Mrs. Pearsons was in contrast to that of Addison Stillwell and Miss May Peabody, which was one of the important events of the social season of 1914. Following the ceremony, the couple left on a two weeks' honeymoon in the East, their destination being kept a secret.

Henry Hudson's Fate. The first navigators who sailed on voyages of discovery to the new world had no easy task to control the adventurous crews who manned their vessels. The troubles that Columbus had to face are well known. Magellan was called upon to put down mutiny among the crew and rebellion among his officers. But to Henry Hudson, discoverer of the river that bears his name, fell the sad fate of being overpowered by mutineers and sent to certain doom at sea. The year following his discovery of Hudson river bay and Hudson strait, his crew rebelled, and seizing Hudson and eight others, bound them and set them adrift in a small boat on Hudson bay, June 23, 1611. They were never heard from again.

Dramatic Power. The first thing that strikes any one who has tried to read Jane Austen's novels aloud is the dramatic power displayed in the conversations. No novelist ever made his or her characters express themselves so simply or forcibly in their parts as she does. It would seem that we have lost in her one of our greatest playwrights. The unfolding of character in dialogue has not been better done by any of our dramatists, and has certainly not been approached by any other novelist. ARMS EXHIBIT IS FEATURE OF AMERICAN LEGION CONVENTION

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 19.—An exhibit of big guns and small arms, comprising the latest weapons of the United States Army, is being held here during the American Legion national convention.

L. A. ILLICIT BOOZE TOLL SINCE JANUARY 1 IS 17

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 19.—Seventeen persons were killed in this city by unlawful liquor, mostly "moonshine" whiskey, since January 1, according to startling figures revealed at the county coroner's office.

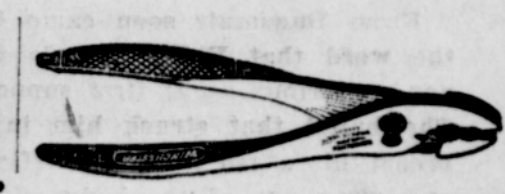
