COSTS OF LIVING INDICATE INCREASE DURING SEPTEMBER
WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—The cost of living is advancing again, wholesale prices having jumped nearly 2 1/2 per cent in September as compared with August, in marked contrast with the downward trend in progress since May, the department of labor announced today. Cloth and clothing showed the greatest increase over the preceding month, amounting to 4 1/2 per cent and was due mainly to the marked advances in raw silk, print cloths and cotton yarn.

The advances in corn, oats, rye, wheat, hogs, cotton, eggs and hay caused the farm products group to rise 3 1/2 per cent in September, as compared with August. A net increase of 3 1/2 per cent is also reported for the food group because of the continued advance in the price of fresh beef, butter, pork, cheese, eggs, flour, lard, cornmeal and sugar.

There were continued declines in building materials, the net decrease being over 2 per cent. Small decreases in fuel and lighting and metals and metal products continued.

SKULL OF HUGE OX IS RECOVERED FROM RIVER
WEST LINN, Ore., Oct. 19.—Paul Bunyan's Blue Ox, or rather what remains of it, has been discovered in the Willamette river between Casemah and Pulp Sliding, it having been pulled up by the Crown-Willamette sand dredger.

W. E. Burns, W. W. Snyder and S. F. Sims were working on the dredge at the time the dipper pulled out of the 50 feet of water the skull of a mammoth vertebrae. The skull is such as to give the impression that the animal was once an elephant, except that it has two gigantic horns extending from the sides of the head.

The distance between the eye sockets of the skull is 18 inches while the horns are 20 inches in circumference at the base and about a foot in length. The skull is petrified. It is believed the animal weighed as much as an elephant. It may be the remains of what was known as the "Brow Ox" a species that had been in existence at the time the mammoth roamed through the Willamette valley.
