What Are "Red Cross Seals"—

An extract from Health First, a magazine issued monthly by Oregon Tuberculosis Association contains an article on Christmas Seals. In 1907 an article in the "Outlook" regarding the use of seals in Norway interested a Delaware woman who had a quantity of stamps designed and promoted their sale. In cooperation with the Red Cross, who, a year later had the stamps designed, the proceeds of the sales were turned over to the National Tuberculosis association. A membership drive culminated in sale of stamps as a source of revenue. The historical connection of the two organizations, coupled with the fact that there is a red, double barred cross on the stamps causes the confusion. To call the penny Christmas Seals "Red Cross Stamps" is a mistake, though this thought may be justifiable to the public it is confusing to both the Tuberculosis and Red Cross workers. Christmas Seals is what everyone buys and the public should get it straight.

S. P. MURDERERS ARE IDENTIFIED

Wore raincoat, also mackinaw, but color is not known. Brother of Nos. 1 and 2.

No. 4. Barnard La Chance. Age, about 30 years. Height 5 feet 8 inches. Weight 150 pounds. Hair black, large quantity of hair. Small black moustache. Is known as radical organizer.

Details Unknown

Officials refuse to divulge the sources of information leading to the identification of the quartet of bandit-murderers, but it is known that articles of wearing apparel found near the scene of the tragedy and in the cabin about a mile from the scene of the holdup have proved important links in the chain of identification. Although officers have not said as much, it is evident that clothing obtained has been identified as belonging to members of the gang. Other fingers of suspicion point to the trio of DeAutremonts and LaChance. Information given by the father of the DeAutremonts and not revealed by officials have added weight to the identification.

Criminologist Has Aided

Although Dan O'Connell, chief special agent of the Southern Pacific and head of the man-hunt, did not state as much, it is known that Prof. Heinrich, famous criminologist of the University of California, has given highly valuable assistance in establishing the identification. In due time the Tidings will reveal the work of Heinrich.

Possibly Three Participated

There is a bare possibility that only three of the four men described took part in the holdup and murder, but there is not the slightest doubt that at least three of the quartet are the guilty men.

May Be in California

Activities of Sheriff Breen and District Attorney Davis, of Del Norte county, Calif., gives some ground for the belief that the bandits may be hiding in the forests of that county. Officials in Ashland have held constant communication with the two California officials.

It is announced that Sheriff Breen and a force of 30 men are following a trail near Waldo, in Indian Valley, which carries with it what is believed important connection with the crime. That they are on the trail of one or more men who are seeking security is evident. Saturday evening Sheriff Breen and a party of men found the scene of a campfire, the ashes and coals of which were still warm.

Officials Are Warned

Although suspicion points to a probability of the bandits being along the coast of northern California or Southern Oregon, local headquarters are not placing too much dependence in the conjecture and are urging officials throughout the Pacific Coast to remain on the alert.

Capture Matter of Days

That it is only a matter of days until the arch-criminals are arrested is the opinion of officials conducting the hunt. The description of the men is so complete that they cannot escape apprehension.

Word has been sent to the four winds to arrest and hold the men incommunicado.

The total reward for the four men totals \$19,200.

and again defended the south goal. Klamath's line held and Ashland kicked to Klamath's five yard line.

Klamath tried line plunging, and made it work for a while, and lost the ball on downs, within one foot of another touchdown. Klamath kicked. Ashland returned to her enemy's 25 yard line, an end run to the right netted fifteen yards, a line buck for a few inches, and followed by a pass over the line resulted in Ashland's last score, with making a pass for goal. Score now 26 to 0.

Ashland again received and returned the kickoff twenty-five yards. Klamath intercepted pass, but lost ball on downs on eleven yard line. Ashland made 20 yard right end run, plunged for five yards, passed for twelve yards, to Klamath's forty yard line. Klamath intercepted.

Fourth quarter—Klamath again started marching down the field toward more points, by continuous line plunging, making down and down, yardage after yardage, bucking Ashland's line and drilling through it for 60 yards without being stopped for a count, but failed to pass goal count. Score 26 to 6.

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 22—The police of the entire state have been asked to assist in the search for 12-year-old May Brown, who disappeared in company with J. A. Devoreaux, a world war veteran and friend of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Brown, the girl's parents, when after a search of almost a week no trace was found of the missing pair.

The police are frankly baffled by the case, declared to be one of the most unusual that has come to their attention, as no trace whatsoever of the child and her companion has been found.

Kidnapping Theory Held

The girl's parents have now abandoned the hope that Devoreaux in whose automobile the child was riding, has been merely delayed in reaching the city, and have joined the police in their belief that the girl has been kidnapped.

MEXICO LIKES YANKEE GAMES

People of Neighboring Republic are Becoming More Sportmanlike as a Consequence.

I had been greatly impressed with what American sports are doing for young Mexico. American sports are common all over the republic now—basketball, baseball, volley ball, handball, tennis and all the typical American sports.

Even the president has a handball court up at Chapultepec for his eighteen-year-old boy to play on. I asked him if he did not feel that these American sports were going to teach his people how to "play the game."

In Mexico the minute a man is defeated for office or the minute that a brother defeats him in debate or wins a girl from him, that Mexican wants to kill his opponent or start a revolution. They have not learned to be what we Americans call "good sports." American games are teaching them this spirit, says William I. Stodger in the Outlook.

After I had explained what I meant he admitted that my implications and deductions were true and that he had manifested his confidence in the Y. M. C. A. which introduced these sports into Mexico, by giving that American institution a government gift of 25,000 pesos.

"What are your personal sports?" I asked him.

"Billiards and poker," he said, with a smile.

LONDON LOSING ITS VOICE

Famous Old Street Cries of the Metropolis Are Dying Out One After Another.

Even in London, most conservative of cities, one by one the famous old street cries are dying out.

In Shakespeare's day the streets were musical with this chanting of tradesmen, calling their wares, each to his own particular lifting tune.

The last to be heard in modern London is that of the lavender peddlers: "Sweet lavender, sweet lavender! 'Won't you buy my sweet lavender? 'Sixteen bunches for a penny!'"

It's still heard on the side streets, but its days are numbered. It's easier to walk to a drug store and get moth-balls.

Just as the street cries are dying out, so also are the London flower girls—famous in song and story—disappearing.

Once they were to be seen all over the city—these "girls" whose ages ranged from sixteen to sixty. Piccadilly Circus has been their last stronghold. But there are signs that they're being ousted even from this favored spot. Men, mostly ex-soldiers out of regular jobs, are now selling flowers.

Man-Killing Horse.

What is said to be the strangest manslaughter case ever tried in the criminal courts of the United States is scheduled to be heard in Middlebury, Vt., in the near future. William Mallock, a farmer, is to face a jury on the charge of being responsible for the death of A. W. Woodcock, an eighty-year-old neighbor. The defendant is the owner of a stallion, which broke away and entered the yard of Woodcock, attacking and killing him before any one could come to his aid. The state will contend that Mallock was directly responsible in that he was negligent in not keeping a vicious animal properly restrained.

The horse was permitted the freedom of its own barnyard, it is said, but broke from the yard, trotted down the highway and entered the open gate of Woodcock's place. It first attacked Floyd Woodcock and was beaten off with a pitchfork. It then approached the old man, striking him down with its hoofs, causing injuries which resulted in his death.

Following Orders.

ILWACO, Wash., Oct. 22.—The bodies of two well-dressed, unidentified men and a badly damaged trolling boat were cast ashore along North Beach, above the old Breaker's Hotel, yesterday. The remains of the two men and the boat came ashore following a heavy storm that prevailed here. The boat is about 28 feet long and bore the number "508 G". A hole was stove in the side of the engine was missing and little of the hull was left. A considerable sum of money was found on the men and this fact, together with the absence of any fishing gear on the boat, leads to the belief that men were not engaged in trolling.

Many life preservers were strewn along the beach, one bearing the name of the steamer Undine, which runs between Portland and Astoria.

The belief exists that the two men may have been engaged in rum running.

POLISH GENERAL WILL PASS THROUGH ASHLAND

In the private car Advance, General Haller and a party of 25 statesmen and military leaders of Poland will arrive during the evening and proceed to Portland.

EX-SALVATION ARMY WOMAN TAKEN AGAIN

DALLAS, Oct. 22.—Mrs. J. M. Robinson, former Salvation Army member, freed at Tillamook recently when indictments charging forgery and obtaining money under false pretences were quashed by the court during her trial, was re-arrested here by a deputy sheriff on new indictments returned by the Tillamook county grand jury, said to contain six counts of larceny by bailer. Mrs. Robinson was released under \$3000 bail furnished by Dallas and Independence friends.

IMPEACHMENT CHARGES FILED AGAINST OKLAHOMA GOVERNOR

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 22.—Impeachment charges against Governor Walton, of this state, were filed this afternoon charging the executive with "wilful neglect of duties, incompetence, corruption, and offenses involving moral turpitude." The investigation committee charged that he prohibited the assembly of a grand jury by training machine guns of the county court house, and that he used official information and power to secure private credit and property.

COMMISSION REPORTS FIVE KILLED IN INDUSTRIES

SALEM, Oct. 22.—There were five deaths due to industrial accidents in Oregon during the week ending October 18, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission today.

The victims were: Robert T. Hodge, Seattle, powder man; Fred Butler, Portland, laborer; Charles E. Rogers, Portland, forman; John Jacobson, Goble, bucker, and Gail F. Riley, Oakridge, faller.

Of the total of 661 accidents reported 545 were subject to the provisions of the workmen's compensation act, 112 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the law, and four were from public utility corporations not subject to state protection.
