PLANES ON NON-STOP FLIGHT CANADIAN BORDER TO MEXICO

EUGENE, Oct. 25—The non-stop Canada to Mexico, airplane was successfully re-fueled in mid air here at 10:02 this morning. Ninety-five gallons of gasoline was transferred from re-fueling plant to flight plane within three minutes, while the plane traveled 105 miles per hour at an altitude of 3,000 feet. Leaving Sumas, Wash., just this side of Canadian border, at 6:25 A. M., Captain Smith and Lieutenant Richter expect to reach the Mexican border at 6:00 tonight. The flight plane will be refueled again at Sacramento. Weather conditions are ideal for flight.

Fruit Canning Demonstration

Miss Elin Galey and Miss Adena Joy gave a demonstration of fruit canning and held the interest of the audience as fully as any other number, in spite of the fact that only men were in attendance. These young ladies were highly complimented by the judge at the state fair, who predicted that if they continued their work they would probably lead the state in a year or two.

Mr. Seymour was again called upon and made a talk which was full of praise and encouragement for the young people. He also took the opportunity of presenting to Mrs. Joy and Mr. Beeson, the pin and button which is furnished by the United States Department of Agriculture to each club leader on 100 per cent completion of club projects. Mr. Reed, who is in charge of the poultry clubs, was informed that he would receive his button as soon as the members had handed in their final papers.

Appreciation Expressed

On behalf of the bankers, H. D. Norton, of Grants Pass, expressed the appreciation of the members for the program which the young people had furnished, and gave the assurance that the bankers wanted the privilege of assisting the club work in any way possible. It was plain to be seen that the presence of so many state champions, first premium winners and efficient demonstrators, coupled with the surprise occasioned by the unusualness of the program, left Mr. Norton in such a state that he found words almost inadequate to express his feelings. The sincerity of his talk left no doubt in the minds of the Club leaders and members as to the impression that had been made on the bankers.

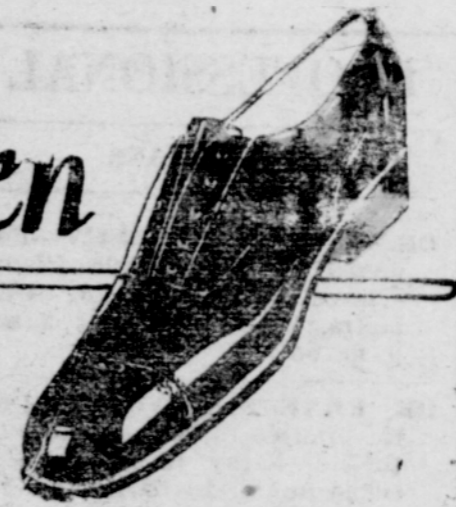
