Valuable Evidence Brought To Light

The officials have within the past 24 hours, unearthed damaging evidence in connection with the identification of the Siskyou bandits, was the statement of District Attorney Rawles Moore this forenoon. Not even the slightest inkling can be gleaned from the officers relative to the discovery but that it is of more importance in establishing the connection of the men sought with the hold-up and quadruple murder, than all other facts established since October 11, there is not the slightest doubt, and it is evident that it is of such nature as to remove all doubts as to the identity of the perpetrators.

That officials have the fear that the D'Autremonts will attempt to secure passage to a foreign country or make their way into Mexico is indicated by new circulars that have been issued by the Postal department, in which attention is called to the possibility of such an occurrence.

FIGHT CONTINUES IN LEGISLATURE

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 26.—A sharp demand for information concerning membership in the Ku Klux Klan in the house of representatives committee appointed to investigate the organization, brought a statement by Speaker McBee that two members were not Klansmen and that one was a Catholic. The speaker ruled that unless members desired to proclaim their lodge affiliations they need not do so. The house reconvened this afternoon to take up the last two impeachment articles against Governor Walton.

NON-STOP FLIGHT OF AIRMEN IS SUCCESS

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Oct. 26.—Captain Lowell Smith and Lieutenant Richter, airmen, who yesterday made the successful non-stop flight from the Canadian to the Mexican border, today talked of making a non-stop flight from Cape Plattery, Wash. to Portland, Maine, if permission could be secured from General Patrick, head of air service. Aerial refueling has been so successful, they predicted, that a 20 hours schedule could be maintained between New York and San Francisco.

OREGON PRUNE IS WORTH AT LEAST 100,000,000 MARKS

SALEM, Oct. 26.—The Oregon Growers' association today announced that it had negotiated a sale of French prunes for shipment to Germany which probably establishes a record sale for prunes as far as the amount of money involved is concerned. The prunes brought approximately 100,000,000 marks each, or 4, 900,000,000 marks a pound. In American money the prunes brought the rate of \$11 for 110 pounds.
