CONVICTS SENT TO PRISON BY PLANE

Kansas Sets New Mark for Rapid Delivery of Men to Penitentiary.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., Oct. 26—In an effort to keep pace with the increased momentum of the wheels of justice, Kansas authorities have enlisted the airways to hurry transportation of prisoners to the state penitentiary.

The first experiment in this unique method of hastening the process of law was made when Chester Connor, sheriff of Sedgwick county, arrived at the penitentiary here at 5 o'clock in the afternoon with three persons who had been convicted in Wichita, 200 miles south, at 2:10 o'clock.

Francis Bowhan, independent pilot, was in charge of the "squadron" of two planes that made the trip. The sheriff's wife accompanied the party as matron for a woman prisoner.

then the front right one, the left front one having a relatively easy life. And this is the why of it all:

We take the right side of the road in passing. Often the wheels on the left side will be rolling on smooth surfaces with the rights are "bumping the bumps," off the edge. This bumping wears the right rear tire most, but the left rear shares with the right rear the brunt of power and traction, not to mention sliding. The front right helps its rear partner carry the extra load that habitually falls on that side of the car. The left front, comparatively speaking, "just rolls along." The moral of this is: Change your tires so as to distribute the wear. It will conserve the labor and materials that go into tires. It will lessen your troubles and the slenderness of your pocketbook.—Automotive Digest.

There are no snakes in Hawaii. This is one of the favorite advertising lines of the Hawaii Tourist Bureau and a fact in which the local populace takes much pride and comfort. Hence the discovery of a live snake in the heart of Honolulu the other day caused quite a stir of excitement, even though this one was only 14 inches long and was apparently not poisonous. Local quarantine officers have decided that the snake reached Honolulu from the coast, probably coming in dry grass packed around a shipment of honey dew melons which had been delivered a few days before near where it was discovered.

Fire insurance losses in Honolulu during the last 10 years have amounted to only 10.32 per cent of the premiums collected by insurance companies and fire losses throughout the country have been very light as compared with the majority of mainland communities, according to a report compiled by a committee of the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce. The report declares that danger of a widespread conflagration in Honolulu is very remote, owing to the large open spaces of the city and the fact that homes in most instances are not built close together. The absence of the necessity for heating houses and larger buildings also lessens the fire hazard appreciably.

Temporary Fuse Repair

A temporary repair for a burnt-out lighting system fuse can be made by wrapping tin foil around the burnt-out fuse cartridge and replacing it again in its proper place in the fuse block. There is no danger of burning out the lighting system, because the tin foil will burn before any danger can occur.—Automotive Digest.

Something Lubricant Will Not Do

One cannot expect an engine to perform satisfactorily when an attempt is made to compel the lubricant to take the place and do the work of poorly-fitting or worn-out rings and pistons. Lubricant quality

cannot overcome the troubles caused by excessive oil feed from worn bearings where high oil pressures are insisted upon in force-feed lubricating systems, or where there is excessive dip in splash systems.—Automotive Digest.

Testing Clutch for Slippage Slippage of a clutch which runs in oil may be overcome by adding kerosene to the oil. This, of course, does not apply to clutches which run in the engine oil. To test a clutch for slippage, proceed as follows: with the brakes set, and the engine running at moderate speed, allow the

clutch to engage quickly. The engine should stall immediately.—Automotive Digest.

Removing the Dust Cap Quickly Removing the dust cap from a tire valve is a tedious job, especially when the threads extend the full length of the valve. For this purpose a piece of coarse twine will be found useful. Give the cord one turn around the cap, and with one end in each hand, give it a sharp pull in the proper direction, and the cap will be rapidly unscrewed.—Automotive Digest.
