DEVELOP A PAYROLL

Frequently we hear the expression, "It is a good town, they have a payroll." The expression is frequently applied to La Grande, Bend, Astoria, and other towns in Oregon, and it is applicable to each. Lumber manufacturing plants and other factories maintain a growing volume of business which is less affected by the prices of agricultural and horticultural products, and by other fluctuations in the world of business.

Payrolls constitute one of the cornerstones of the foundation on which business volume is erected. It is superfluous to say the larger the payroll the better the town; yet it is a fact demanding the serious thought of those living where payrolls have not been developed to any appreciable degree.

The towns of the future will be erected on payrolls. The town that fails to give consideration to this fact will be the laggard in the business development that is near at hand.

There is an infant industry in Ashland, which if properly supported and nurtured, will, within a few years, become an important factor in developing a payroll for the town. The canner of the Ashland Preserving company is the one referred to. Men with business acumen and business nerve are exerting commendable efforts to establish the institution on a paying basis. They are putting out a product that holds much of merit, and at a price within the reach of every household. Future results, however, are not entirely in the hands of the promoters, but rest to a marked degree on the co-operation given by the retail merchants and the consumers of Ashland. Manufacturing an article is only an instance in establishing a successful industry. As much, perhaps more, depends on the marketing of the article. A demand must be created for it and consumption is imperative. Retail merchants can extend valuable aid in overcoming the prejudice that usually exists in respect to the products manufactured at home; they can aid in creating a demand for it, and in so doing they will be laying the foundation for increased payrolls in Ashland.

Proper loyalty on the part of every Ashland housewife is essential to the ultimate success of the industry. Loyalty developed for the product at home will spread to adjoining districts, and ultimately the demand becomes general.

The Tidings assumes the responsibility in saying that the canned fruit and vegetables of the local company deserve to be carried on the shelves of every grocery store in the town, and they deserve the patronage of every household in the town.

A great deal of the future of Ashland depends on the payrolls developed. Make secure the industries we have at present, and they in turn will attract others. With this in mind, there will be no doubt regarding the future of Ashland.

BERLIN, Oct. 31.—Five thousand happy children cheered America and the Quaker relief workers at a "Dankfest" held here to express appreciation for the free food that had kept them well and strong during the years of privation since the war. They came from the Prenzlauer district of the welfare organization and spoke also for the 500,000 children in Germany who are benefiting by the food kitchens.

The kiddies, boys, and girls, and the majority around ten years of age, danced and clapped their hands when announcement was made that the Quakers were coming back to them from America. This relief work was organized and developed shortly after the war because of the critical condition of hundreds of thousands of German children as a result of the lean years so important in their growth. The Quakers, backed by American money collected through their agency, perfected their organization so well that last year they were able to turn it over to the German relief branch, operating under government branches, including the Ministries of Health, Food, Labor and Interior. The Quakers were then able to turn their attention to Russia. But with the new economic crisis brought on by the Ruhr occupation the Germans have not been able to meet the demand. They were most anxious about the future, because they have funds to carry on only until the end of October. But the Quakers have just assured them that they will again come to their aid.

It is likely that the Quakers will leave the operation of the relief in the hands of the German organization. A new German committee will be appointed to administer under a board of trustees nominated by the Quakers. It is feared here that with the coming of winter the need will greatly increase, and German officials express the deepest gratification over the timely offer of further help by the Quakers. Dr. Rau, executive secretary of the German committee, told the International News Service correspondent that American aid had already saved thousands of lives and will save thousands more, and he added that whatever the political differences might be between the two countries Germany could never forget this Christian help for those not responsible for politics.

The "Dankfest" was a joyous affair. Five thousand little children are more than the number suggests, especially when they are well fed and on holiday behavior. There was some charming singing and group dancing, but when the city dignitaries attempted to get serious about the relief movement and the future citizenry of Germany their speeches were drowned by noises that only restless children can make. Nobody heard the speeches, and they didn't seem very important, for a sample "kitchen dinner" was on the programme, and cries from the gallery indicated that this is very popular.

The Thanksgiving was attended by a group of American tourists associated with or interested in the work of the Quakers. Ambassador Houghton was represented by Warren D. Robins, counselor of the Embassy, who received a little lad, representing the children, and assured him that America knew no national boundaries when little children were suffering.

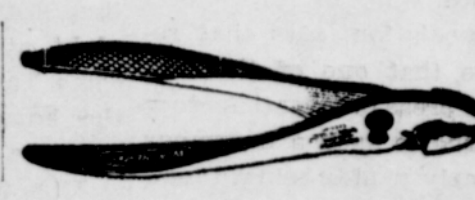
