Daily News Letter

MANILLA, Nov. 2.—Ninety-eight per cent of Filipinos harbor intestinal parasites, and 79 per cent of the population is infected with hookworm, according to a circular just issued by the Director of Health giving the results of investigations in various parts of the islands. Carbon tetrachloride was found to be the most effective drug against hookworm and to a lesser degree against ascariis, trichuris and oxyurus—other dangerous parasites of the human interior. The high percentage of infections was found in the Province of Cebu, but other portions of the islands showed similar results. Most of the infections were of light nature.

The Philippine League of Consumers has filed a protest against the current agitation among local chambers of commerce against the continuation of the C. O. D. parcels post system from the United States. They claim that local merchants are charging prices that are inordinately high.

San Fernando, La Union province, on the west coast of Luzon, has been designated as a port at which foreign vessels may load and unload cargo. Other ports having similar privileges are: Pulubas; Tabaco, Albay, and Davao Mindanao. These ports, however, are not regular ports of entry.

Ponciano C. Caramba, a Manila resident, has petitioned the local courts to permit him to change his surname to Maramba. He claims that his present name sounds so much like a favorite Spanish curse-word that it causes him embarrassment at times.

Squatters to the number of 138 on the United States Military Reservation in Tarlac province are making a hard fight against being ousted from Uncle Sam's territory. They recently received an order to clear out, but have steadfastly refused to do so.

The recent differences between tenant farmers and landlords in Nais, Cavite province, as a result of which 1,000 tenants went on strike, have been ironed out, and an agreement has been entered into between the conflicting parties.

CONVENTION MARKED BY STRONG ADDRESSES (Continued from page 1)

The Sunday school worker, contact with the Word of God, the teaching of God's Word, human love (co-operation), and wholesome self-expression.

Mrs. Edgar, at the close of this address, sang very beautifully "Make Me a Channel of Blessing."

A short conference of "Vaccination Schools" was led by Dr. Van Nuys to be continued at the Fellowship Luncheon that followed the morning session.

After a short devotional song service, "The Needs of the Rural Schools" was discussed in a very definite way by Rev. Mr. Ames, Presbyterian Missionary in this district. The interdependency of the rural and urban communities was

touched upon the lack of leadership at home, when often furnishing leaders in urban communities, the need to get in closer touch, and the desire of every community for religious training for their children were some of the things brought out in Mr. Ames's address.

Capt. Porter, of the Salvation Army brought a beautiful song at this time, accompanied by Miss Pine.

"Cradle Roll Work" was the subject of a splendid address by Mrs. Fred Engle, who, from her rich experience, brought before her hearers the importance and the place that this work occupies in the program of the Sunday school and the church.

Dr. Milliken's address that closed the opening program gave food for thought and presented some startling facts that should be an impetus to greater endeavor for the young people of the state.

Six hundred and twenty-six thousand people in Oregon are not touch-

ed by any religious influence, and in the U. S. there are 28,675,000 not so influenced; of the 16,600,000 from Christian homes there are 2,000,000 young people not affiliated with church or Sunday school."

Miss Peñnell sang very sympathetically "No Crown Without the Cross" at the end of the session.

The evening session opened as usual with devotional service led by Capt. Hall of the Baptist church. The Baptist choir, assisted by members of the Congregational choir and Mrs. Edgar, Mrs. Henry and Capt. Porter gave a number of very beautifully rendered choruses, led by Mr. Gilmore. One of which was by the young people's choir "The Rose of Sharon."

Rev. W. Judson Oldfield, who had the opening address emphasized "Teacher Training" and the need for readjustment in methods of Sunday school work. That an understanding of child psychology is a necessary equipment of the teacher and that, with that, a consecrated

life, and devotion to the work, the creation of Christian citizenry was assured.

The listeners were now favored by a beautiful solo, with violin and piano accompaniment, sung by Mrs. Henry of Junior High.

Dr. Van Nuys in the closing address of the evening brought his vital message. In speaking of the revolt of youth, he said "Can we read the heart of youth?" "Is the revolt against religion or irreligion?" If a revolt, then there is grave concern for the future. Perhaps a revolt against organized forms of religion." Dr. Van Nuys, discussed the difference between conditions surrounding youth now, and a generation ago, and that the roads were wider and longer and the difficulty of getting back greater.

The statement was made that the decisive battles were not fought in college life but in the high school ages. He brought the responsibility back to the home, that the church ought not to be considered a spiritual orphan asylum.
