THEY TELL A STORY

A report from Portland reveals that two were killed and seven wounded over Sunday in accidents. The day previous a car and four occupants were dashed 200 feet down the embankment of the Columbia River highway. From elsewhere in the state reports tell of deaths sustained and injuries received, due, in nine cases out of ten, to automobile accidents.

These reports tell a story of the toll of the reckless and irresponsible driver, the number of which is increasing daily. Frequently we hear the statement that no one is safe along the highways and roads of the state, and it is true. Drivers who have a proper regard for human life and who exercise every care in their use of the road is in constant peril of the reckless driver, or the driver crazed with moonshine.

How much longer will the grim reaper be permitted to stalk the public highways of Oregon, is a question that is being asked by many thousands of automobile owners in the state. Doubtless the safe and sane people of the state are also beginning to realize that it is high time that the traffic department of Oregon be granted sufficient funds and men with which to combat the rapidly increasing danger. As the Tidings understands the present regrettable situation, the funds of the traffic department have been curtailed until only a mere handful of traffic officers are available to patrol some three or four thousand miles of highways. Perhaps the traffic department was hit at the same time other retrenchment was instituted in the state, but it is poor economy to cripple a department of government on which depends the safety and lives of thousands. If the combined salaries of a few more traffic officers are of greater value than the toll of lives taken weekly then let death continue to hold its wake on our highways, claiming weekly the lives and limbs of a dozen or more men, women, and children.

A MUNICIPAL ASSET

The Tidings of yesterday carried an unofficial yet authentic report of the receipts and profits of Ashland's auto camp ground. It was a report that to many citizens was both surprising and gratifying. It was surprising in that it showed the patronage of this year to have been nearly double that of 1922. It was perhaps surprising that the auto camp ground has developed into a municipal asset returning a profit of approximately \$3000 for the present year. That the auto camp has become an asset returning a handsome profit, surprising to many in the amount, is gratifying to all.

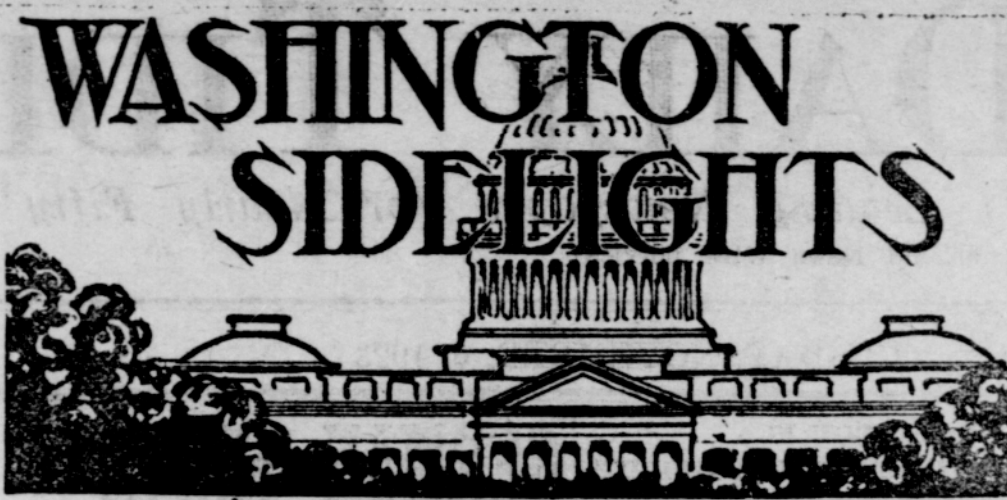
The 1923 record shows that 7381 cars occupied by parties of from two to five people spent at least one night in the auto camp and beautiful park adjoining. Other thousands entered the park and enjoyed it for a few hours or a day, not taking out the camping privileges. All in all it is not unreasonable to assume that at least 10,000 tourist parties entered and enjoyed the beautiful camp ground during a period not exceeding six months. Assuming that each car carried three people we had grand total of 30,000 strangers enjoying the combined auto camp and park for a period of time ranging from a few hours to a week.

The report affords an index to the real value of the tourist trade from a financial view point. If the 30,000 visitors spent on an average of three dollars and fifty cents each the tourists visiting Ashland this year expended over \$100,000 with the merchant, the meat market, the garage, the filling station, the ice cream fountain, and other lines of business. The assumption that the tourist crop was worth \$100,000 to Ashland it not in the least unreasonable. In providing accommodations for a trade that placed \$100,000 in the business channels of Ashland the sum of \$2000 was expended, not figuring the cost of the camp grounds. In other words the total expense connected with maintaining the auto camp for the year will probably not exceed \$2000, yet the volume of trade attracted by it turned fifty-times that amount into the tills and cash register of Ashland firms. More, the auto camp itself pays a clean profit of \$3,000. With these figures available who will deny that the auto camp and park do not constitute by far the greatest municipal asset possessed by the city? Does not the report indicate that within three or four years the tourist crop has developed into our most valuable asset, paying greater dividends per amount of investment than any other of our resources?

Does not the report constitute a source of information revealing the real value and possibilities of the auto camp? Is it not of sufficient value to warrant an aggressive and liberal plan of development to meet the increasing patronage from year to year?

The auto camp is a asset of such compelling interest as to demand the views of citizens relative to the future. Views publicly expressed through the Tidings or some other source will form a guide-post of value to the park board in arranging their plans for another year. Plans for future development must be comprehensive and the men who are directing the destinies of this important asset can act with greater freedom and increased intelligence if they are close to public sentiment.

To make the coming winter fair an unqualified success it must receive the hearty support of every resident of Ashland.



Society Awaits White House Program

WASHINGTON.—If Washington keeps up the present pace, with normal acceleration, it will be "going some" by the first of December, when the official world considers itself "all set" for the winter.

Miss Laura Harlan, who was Mrs. Harding's social secretary, and is Mrs. Coolidge's, has returned from Murray bay, whither she betook herself about the time that Mrs. Harding left town, for a belated vacation. She had just reached the Harlan family's summer quarters there when the news of the President's sudden passing brought her flying back to Washington to be of the greatest possible service in the emergency it precipitated. She stayed on, detailed by Mrs. Coolidge to do everything she could to aid and comfort Mrs. Harding up to the time of the latter's departure for Marion.

Now she is back and it is assumed that before very long the winter's White House program will be announced. It is rather necessary to announce it early because social Washington never can make its plans with any confidence of being able to carry them out until it knows what dates the White House has permitted.

Miss Mary Randolph, who has been serving Mrs. Coolidge temporarily, has turned things over to Miss Harlan, probably with a sigh of relief. Miss Randolph is a Washington woman who had occasionally helped out when Mrs. Coolidge needed a social secretary during the two seasons she has been in Washington. She was not in very good health and Mrs. Coolidge, regarding her as a personal friend, was glad to accept her help when she volunteered immediately after the Coolidges' hasty return last August. She was invaluable at that time and will probably be frequently at the White House.

So far, whatever else may be said of him, all Washington will tell you that Calvin Coolidge is the most domestic President who ever has occupied the White House. In the first three months of his presidency he has not attended a single movie or theater, not even a ball game; he has not accepted a single social invitation, and has dined out only once at a small informal dinner, not to be dignified by the term "party," with personal friends, since he came to the White House. He is up and ready for business at six o'clock, and usually in bed by ten. There's a fine example of the simple life in high places for you!

Immigrants Send \$400,000,000 Back Home

IMMIGRANTS in the United States sent back to their native lands in 1922 funds amounting to approximately \$400,000,000, according to a survey recently completed and made public by the United States Department of Commerce. The immigrants' aggregate remittances in 1922 show a falling off of approximately \$200,000,000 from 1919, when the funds sent home, due to war relief, reached \$600,000,000. Remittances now are twice as large as before the war.

"There are in this country some 14,000,000 persons of foreign birth, a large proportion of whom regularly send money to their friends abroad, either in drafts or currency or postal orders," says the survey. "The foreign recipients are thus enabled to buy American goods without giving their own products in exchange, or else to buy foreign goods and pay for them with drafts on America."

"In 1922 the amount of such remittances is estimated to have been somewhat over \$400,000,000. A portion of this money was probably sent to Europe in payment for small parcels of goods which figure in merchandise imports. Against it, too, would have to be counted the cash brought into the country by newly arriving immigrants, though this would be more than offset by cash carried out of the country by emigrants and currency sent by mail."

"Figures compiled by the commissioner of immigration give money brought in by immigrants in 1922 as \$30,000,000. This, however, is an understatement, since the immigrant is not required to state the amount in his possession in excess of \$50."

"Immigrants' remittances have declined for many reasons. Many have brought their families over; others have themselves gone home. The new immigration law has reduced the number of men who come here to work for a brief period only, leaving their families behind. Moreover, the need for relief in Europe is not so great. Nevertheless, the amount of immigrants' remittances is still twice as large as in the period before the war."

Here are sample figures on commercial vessels:
1914-15—Vessels, 1311; cargo tonnage, 5,881,735; tolls, \$5,171,757.
1919-20—Vessels, 2,580; cargo tonnage, 9,839,918; tolls, \$8,965,342.
1922-23—Vessels, 4,272; cargo tonnage, 21,210,962; tolls, \$18,975,189.

First Estimate of "Invisible Exchange"

RESULTS of the first attempt of the Department of Commerce to make a careful estimate of the volume of so-called invisible exchange have been announced by Secretary of Commerce Hoover.

The figures indicate that instead of foreign countries owing the United States \$754,000,000, representing the excess of exports over imports for the year 1922, various items of invisible exchange reduce the amount to \$329,000,000.

The detailed estimates relate to the year 1922, since which the balance of trade has turned against the United States. Commenting on the different situation existing in 1923, Mr. Hoover says there has been a continued movement against the United States in the current items of invisible exchange as well as on merchandise account and

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the Board of Directors of the TALENT IRRIGATION DISTRICT, a municipal corporation of Jackson County, State of Oregon, deeming it for the best interest of said district that the hereinafter mentioned contract should be entered into between said district and the State of Oregon, have called a SPECIAL ELECTION to be held and which will be held on THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 15th, 1923, between the hours of eight o'clock A. M. and five o'clock P. 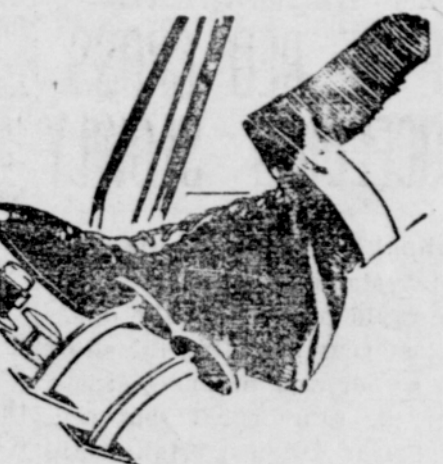
