OLDEST OF APPLE ORCHARDS

It is in the Mountains of New Mexico, and Probably Was Planted in 1635.

America's oldest apple orchard, so far as known, is a group of trees in a remote hamlet of the Manzana mountains of central New Mexico. The origin of this orchard is lost in antiquity. How it came there, whence the seed, who the planter, are questions that go unanswered.

The word "manzano" is Spanish for apple tree, and "manzano" means apple. It is believed that the New Mexico orchard was started by one Fra Geronimo de la Liana, a missionary from Mexico who in 1635 came to Quari, five miles below the present hamlet of Manzana. There was at Manzana, it is said, a wonderful spring, says the American Forestry Magazine, and it is believed that Spanish priest planted the orchard near the spring.

Although this early settlement was abandoned for more than a century because of Apache raids, the orchard grew on. As it stands today it is in two groups, one of fifty trees, the other of sixteen trees. The trees are of "sprout" growth, many of them in groups of two or three starting from a common center. They still bear fruit, although the apples are small. The guardian of the orchard today is the Rev. Jose Gauthier, a French priest who has served the Manzana townpeople for the last twenty-five years. The orchard is the property of the local church.

BEETLE EATS MOSQUITO GRUB

Insect Found on the African Gold Coast Helps Reduce the Number of Pests.

A beetle on the African Gold Coast has the useful habit of eating the "grubs" of mosquitos. The bug, a tiger beetle with the imposing name of Cicindela octoguttata, goes to the edges of ponds where the grubs are swimming, and fishes them out of the water. It helps very materially to reduce the number of mosquitos in any area which it inhabits.

One of the great problems of modern tropical medicine is the killing of mosquito larvae, consequently it is probable that an effort will be made to cultivate the new beetle extensively. At present one method of the same sort is in use in most malaria countries. This consists in putting shoals of a tiny fish known as "millions" into mosquito ponds. The "millions" feed on the grubs.

Science is beginning to take a very deep interest in these "balances of nature," for it is probable that, by making a judicious use of them, both health and crops can be improved. The ravages of the "green fly," for instance, are controlled by the "lady bird." In a poor ladybird year the green fly becomes a serious pest.

Ancient Japanese Tombs.

Tombs of six imperial ancestors have just been discovered in obscure spots in the suburbs of Kyoto. They have been identified as those of the sons and daughters of Emperor Go-daigo, who was banished to Oki Island by Ashikaga, the usurper, 584 years ago. The Emperor Go-daigo dispatches his sons to nearby provinces to raise recruits for his campaign against Ashikaga and their tombs are scattered around the country. The imperial mausoleum board is making a search for ancient graves, with the hope that discoveries will be made which will help in the study of the history of the country.

shall pay same fee as exhibitors birds.

Rule 12. When there is only one exhibitor in a class second money will be paid.

Rule 13. Protests against awards must be made in writing and deliv-

ered to the Secretary within twelve hours after the awards have been announced for the class accompanied by five dollars which will be returned if the protest is sustained.

Rule 14. All birds must be plainly banded and band numbers to correspond plainly marked on the entry blanks. When not placed on specimens the Superintendent will furnish same at a cost of ten cents each.

Rule 15. Handling of birds or rabbits on exhibition is positively prohibited except by the owner or on his authority by the regularly authorized official.

Rule 16. All stock must remain in the show room until after ten P. M. December eighth, and will be cared for until noon of the following day.

Rule 17. The latest regulations regarding Barred Plymouth Rock and S. C. Brown Leghorns will prevail, but in competing for specials the Standard Classes only will compete.

Poultry and Rabbits

Singles—1st, \$3.00; 2nd—\$2.00; 3rd—\$1.00.

Pens: 1st—\$4.00; 2nd—\$2.50; 3rd—\$1.25.

Commercial Breeders Class

This class will include laying pens of six females.

A special committee will have charge of this class.

The light weight breeds will be in a separate class from the heavy breeds.

Five entries in each class will be necessary to carry out the plan.

Cash premiums will be paid for the three pens laying the highest number of eggs for the four days, commencing Wednesday A. M. Concluding Saturday at five P. M.

Prizes: 1st—\$4.00; 2nd—\$2.00; 3rd—\$1.00.

Single Entries and Breeding Pens

This class will also include single entries of cocks, cockerels, hens and pullets and breeding pens young and old of one male and four females. Premiums awarded on commercial rules but standard disqualifications for the breed apply in judging this class.

Rabbits and Caves

Awards will be made strictly in accordance with the latest rules of the National Breeders and Fanciers Association.

The classes excepting in New Zealand and Flemish will consist of Senior Buck, Senior Doe, Junior Buck and Junior Doe. (Over six months, senior, under six months junior.)

New Zealand classes are as follows: Does and litters, baby juniors, three to four months; Junior, four to six months; intermediate, six to eight months; senior, over eight months.

Flemish are junior under six months, intermediate six to eight months, senior over eight months.

TELLS OF NEW WATER SUPPLY

Will Develop Bell View

Engineer Walker states that the proposed plan will not only relieve the shortage in Ashland but will provide sufficient water for the irrigation of the 1600 acres in Bell View, making that one of the richest districts in the county, and that the development there will mean much to the future development of Ashland.

Route to Be Followed

Plans announced will include a 3,000 foot syphon line across Emigrant creek canyon and over Song or hill. Then the line will enter the south side of the valley and will attain a point well above Bell View district, following along the side of the hill west to the eastern limits of Ashland. The line will continue along the side of the hill, above all homes to Ashland creek, and from there will be piped across to the old Anderson ditch. The line will cross Ashland creek at the extreme upper end of the auto camp ground. From the Anderson ditch on the hill west of town the main canal will follow practically the same route as the old ditch to a point in the northern part of the city. The main canal will serve all acreage tracts as it enters the city on the east. A valve will be installed in the pipe that carries the water across Ashland creek in order that surplus water may be turned into that stream to supply all tracts in the lower part of town. Then the fact that the main canal will extend to the Ike Bailey place on the hill to the west of town will permit a diversion of the water to all tracts in the northern district.

Double Pipe System Not Required

Engineer Walker says: "Despite reports to the contrary, a double system of pipes will not be required in the city. It is not proposed to use water from Emigrant unit for domestic purposes, but for the irrigation of acreage tracts alone. At most there will not be more than a few thousand feet of low pressure pipe. For most part an open ditch will be used. The plan proposed does not provide for carrying the water in pipes only where it is absolutely necessary. It is also probable that the additional supply will be diverted to the S. P. yards for use in boilers, where pure water is not required."

Ashland Creek Supply Insufficient

To construct a reservoir up Ashland creek that will store 100,000,000 gallons of water will cost not less than \$100,000, says Mr. Walker. "It is possible to construct a reservoir of greater capacity but it would be highly impracticable and out of reason," he said. Not more than 200 acres of land can be irrigated with 100,000,000 million gallons, hence it is evident that the cost per share would be \$500, a prohibitive figure.

Draws Comparison.

In conclusion, Mr. Walker says, "To store 100,000,000 gallons up Ashland creek will cost, for irrigation purposes, \$500 per acre, but if we enter into the development of the Emigrant creek unit we will secure a needed supply of water for a great deal less money and at the same time make it possible to develop the rich Bell View District. The fact is, we will secure double the amount of water from the Emigrant creek unit at less money and at the same time be aiding in the development of a rich territory that joins the corporate limits."

Friendly Suit Is On

Under direction of City Attorney Briggs, Ashland is carrying on friendly action to determine the legality of entering into a contract with the Talent Irrigation District. The suit will be carried up to the supreme court in order that all phases can be cleared up.

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
