CITIZENS URGE RESERVOIR

(Continued from first page.)

need, say those favoring the Ashland creek project, and the additional supply will be available within a year if a reservoir is constructed up the creek. They estimate that at least two years will be required to obtain water from Emmigrant creek.

Regarding Sanitation Opponents of the Emmigrant creek project point out that it is proposed to carry the water through Ashland for most part in open ditches, and recall the time when physicians condemned open ditches in Ashland some years ago, even though the water was used only for irrigation purposes. They maintain that the same condition will obtain in the future, and that if water from Ashland creek is used it can be carried in pipes, as they are at present and that all of the water will be suitable for domestic purposes as well as for irrigation.

Makes Statement Relative to the further development of the Ashland creek supply, Mr. Patterson makes the following statement:

"I have no selfish motive in this enterprise. A few of the citizens of Ashland contributed to a fund making it possible to hire an engineer to make a survey of a suitable site for a reservoir, which we were unable to get from the city engineer. I contributed five days of labor, as well as my share of other expenses in what I consider a good enterprise.

"The voters were asked a few years ago to vote on a \$100,000 bond issue for the construction of a reservoir up Ashland creek canyon. It was carried by a big majority, but was pigeon-holed by the council without giving any reason why, and it stands today.

"The reason I favor a reservoir up Ashland creek is that we will be developing and having under our control our own resources, and make it possible to double the capacity of our electric light plant, which would save the city thousands of dollars now paid out for electric power. This saving alone will take care of extra expense and take care of a big portion of interest on the bonds that will be required in either event.

"I oppose entering into a contract with the Talent District because the construction of our city charter makes it illegal to enter into a contract of the expenditure of that sum of money without obtaining the consent of the majority of taxpayers by vote, and I am, and we all should be willing to abide by the will of the majority, which is the fairest and most impartial way. This will settle the question right."

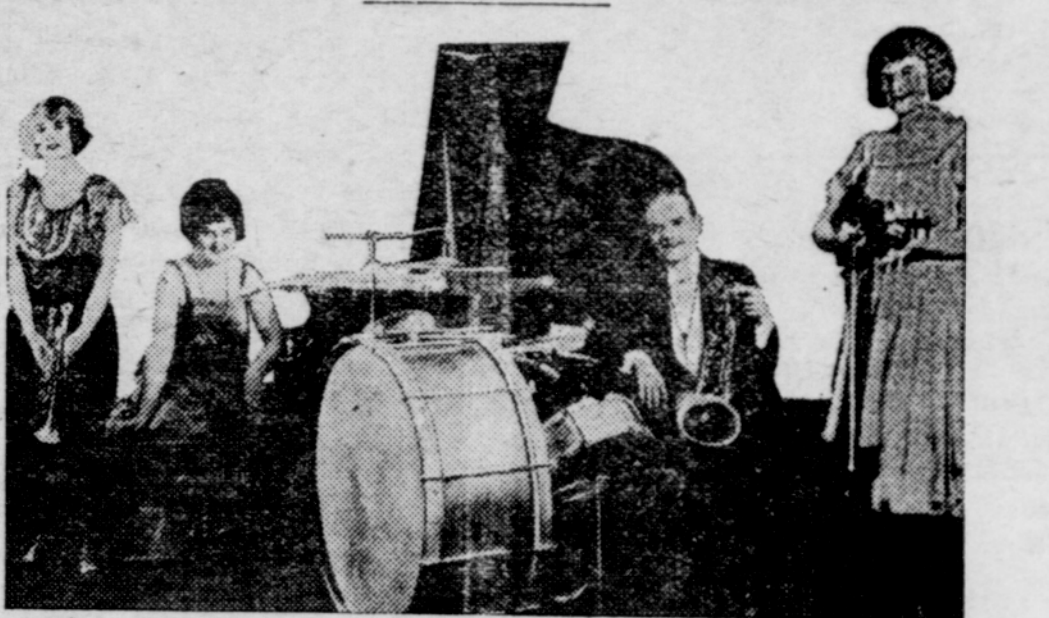

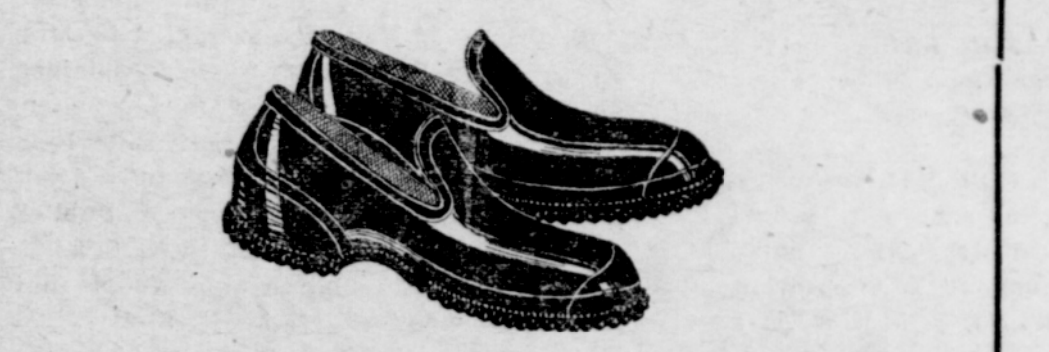
