

land creek project, and the additional supply will be available within a year if a reservoir is constructed up the creek. They estimate that at least two years will be required to obtain water from Emmigrant creek.

Regarding Sanitation

Opponents of the Emmigrant creek project point out that it is proposed to carry the water through Ashland for most part in open ditches, and recall the time when physicians condemned open ditches in Ashland some years ago, even though the water was used only for irrigation purposes. They maintain that the same condition will obtain in the future, and that if water from Ashland creek is used it can be carried in pipes, as they are at present and that all of the water will be suitable for domestic purposes as

well as for irrigation.

ATTACKED BY A RHINOCEROS




