SUSPECTED MURDERERS HURRIED FROM MOB

Madera, Cal. Nov. 12.—Fearing mob violence due to the threatening actions of a mob of over one hundred men who had gathered near the jail, Sheriff Barnett held Walter Yeager and Harry Townsend, suspected of being the murderers of the Merced county jail, 35 miles south of here early today.

DEATH PENALTY AWAITS COVELL

Verdict of Murder in First Degree Reached by Jury Within Two Hours.

COQUILLE, Nov. 12. Arthur Covell, crippled astrologer, must pay the penalty of the gallows for the death of Mrs. Ebba Covell, his sister-in-law. He was convicted of murder in the first degree this afternoon by a jury here after the jurymen had deliberated two hours.

ACQUAINTANCE HEARS VERDICT

The murder was committed September 3 at the Covell home near Bandon. The cripple was not in the least upset by the verdict and smiled soon as he was being carried from the courtroom. He was placed on his cot to hear the verdict read.

All of the jury members were in favor of conviction, but one of the women members wanted to send Covell to the penitentiary for life, instead of hanging him. Finally she went over with the others and signed the verdict for first degree murder.

ATTORNEYS COMPLIMENTED

At the conclusion of the case Judge Kendall complimented the attorneys of both sides for expediting the case. He said the case was well tried and had set a new record in the court for the amount of ground covered. The case started Wednesday morning.

KLAN SPEAKER TAKES RAP AT NEWSPAPERS

MOTHER TO FACE SON'S SLAYERS TO ASCERTAIN MOTIVE FOR MURDER

YREKA, Calif., Nov. 12.—Hurried to the Siskiyou County jail under cover of darkness by Sheriff A. S. Calkins, William Hard and Roland C. Erno, confessed slayers of Fred Skeen, rancher of the Sam's Neck region, are to-day safely behind the bars after the long trip from Los Angeles, where they were captured a week ago.
