We visit the cemetery and make our way to a green mound, at the head of which is a white cross, and we are impressed with the millions of sacrifices and heart aches with which victory was secured.

THE REAL AMERICA

There are vast resources for speculation and economic study in statistics compiled by the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce revealing that rural America, with 44 per cent of the nation's population, owns 70 per cent of its automobiles.

These statistics further reveal that towns having a population from 1,000 to 5,000 own 20 per cent of the Nation's automobiles, although they comprise only nine per cent of the total population.

Accepting automobile ownership as an accurate barometer of private wealth these statistics confirm the long recognized concentration of wealth in communities having a population of between 1,000 and 5,000 persons with the average of individual wealth decreasing as the population increases or decreases from those limits.

GOLDEN RULE SUNDAY DEC. 2

President Coolidge Endorses Plan Adopted at International Conference.

Menu for International Golden Rule Sunday Will Remind Mankind Adversity Exists.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—President Coolidge in a letter made public today by Charles V. Vickrey, General Secretary of Near East Relief, endorses the plan for observing Golden Rule Sunday.

Plans for the day, as outlined by a recent international conference in Geneva, call upon people of fourteen different countries to serve a menu in their homes similar to that served in orphanages in the Near East.

The President's letter says: "It is with a good deal of satisfaction that I commend your proposal to observe an International Golden Rule Dinner Sunday, on the second of December, 1923."

"I feel sure that this suggestion will meet with very widespread approval and will bring more closely to mind the charitable requirements of those who are prosperous to those who are in adversity."

It suggests not only a practical method for help, but the highest expression of sympathy, by sharing for a time the privations of others.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The Harding Memorial Association, recently incorporated under the laws of Ohio for the purpose of providing a suitable depository for the remains of the late President and to perpetuate his homestead at Marion, Ohio, as a shrine for housing the mementos of his long public service, has opened National Headquarters at 1414 F Street, N. W., and is perfecting a nation-wide organization for carrying out its plan.

Announcement has been made that Harding Memorial Week will be observed throughout the country from December 9th to 16th. During this period exercises and services of many kinds will be held commemorative of Mr. Harding's life as President and citizen.

What and Where is Atlantis?

The name is that of an imaginary island of vast extent lying in the Atlantic ocean off the Pillars of Hercules. It is said that an Egyptian priest first told Solon of its existence. It is mentioned for the first time by Plato in the Timaeus and Critias. He gives a glowing account of the land, and enriches it with a fabulous history. About 9,000 years before his time the island is said to have been submerged by an earthquake, sent as a punishment for the wickedness of the people. Some authorities have identified the Canary Islands with the lost Atlantis, while others hold the story to be a fable.

Queer Dusan Customs.

Many things are tabooed among the Dusan tribe on the island of Borneo. A man may not mention his own name, that of his father, mother, mother-in-law, or father-in-law. It is forbidden, or at least it is unwise, to point at the rainbow, because the finger which is pointed will rot away. There is a general belief in the existence of tailed men, who are said to be cannibals. Giants called Tempulalongol figure largely in the folklore of the people. These seem to be supernatural beings who have a liking for visiting burial places and calling on the dead to rise from their graves.

A "Piece" of Sea.

I want awfully to tell you, today about a little "piece" of green sea and gulls, and clouded sky with the usual golden mountain-breaks to the southward. It was wonderful, the sea near at hand was living emerald; the white breasts and wings of the gulls as they circled above—high above were dyed bright green by the reflection. Luck at Cards.

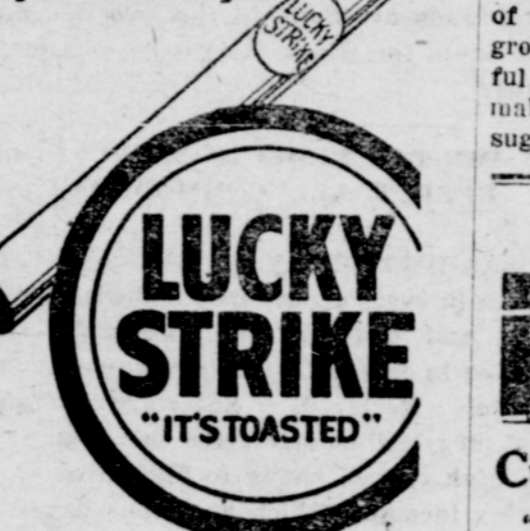

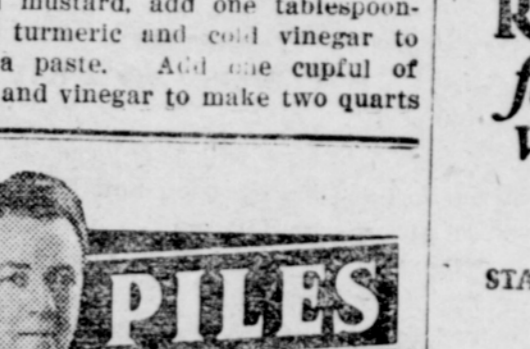

RECIPES IN SEASON

Now is the time to prepare some of these good things for the winter: Mustard Pickle.—Take one quart of small cucumbers, one quart of pared cucumbers cut into half-inch cubes, one quart of green tomatoes cut into cubes but not peeled, one quart of button onions, one large cauliflower divided, three green and one red pepper chopped. Make a brine of four quarts of cold water and a pint of salt, pour over the vegetables and let stand twenty-four hours. Put over the heat and cook until the vegetables are thoroughly scalded. Drain in a colander. Mix one cupful of flour with six tablespoonsful of ground mustard, add one tablespoonful of turmeric and cold vinegar to make a paste. Add one cupful of sugar, and vinegar to make two quarts

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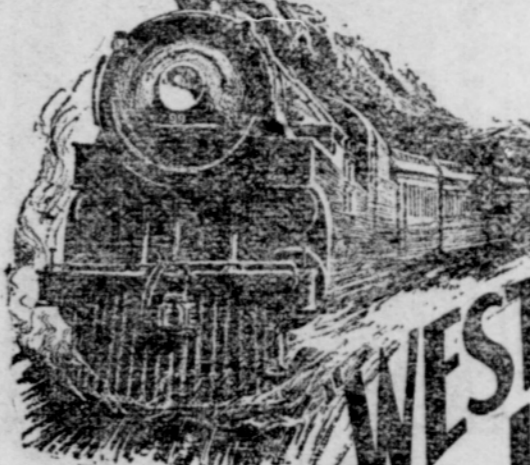
