France May Occupy Hamburg in Retaliation for Crown Prince's Return.

Senator King Criticies Administration for Not Acting in Critical Situation.

ROME, Nov. 14 .- With the return of the former Crown Prince of Germany to his native land, and with passports in the hands of the former Emperor, who is expected to dash over the boundary to Germany, the situation in old world affairs grows graver. France has notified other allied powers of its intention to occupy Hamburg, the gerat seaport of Germany, according to unconfirmed reports circulated in diplomatic circles here today. Italy is opposed. France considered punitive measures in the Ruhr in retaliation for Germany allowing the former Crown Prince to return and for rejecting the French demand for the reestablishment of allied military control, but later turned to the idea occupying Hamburg, advices
