VARIED TYPES IN NEGLIGEEES APPEAR AS WINTER COMES



NEGLIGEEES reflect the coming of winter with less emphasis than any other of our clothes, but do not ignore it. Some of them seem to anticipate a perpetual summer warmth indoors, and assume no responsibilities as a protection against chill, but they undertake to be ravishingly pretty. These are the affairs of georgette, lace, chiffon or crepe de chine and other light fabrics that have a gay summer tint and take unflinching steam heat—or Southern climates—for granted. Breakfast coats of taffeta or satin resemble these airy negligees, but are more practical. One of these is shown in the picture. They are just as colorful, but have no trailing ends of drapery. Gay, soft colors in changeable weaves are popular and their trimming is usually made of self material, used in frills, plaitings or ruffles, with picot edges, put on in fanciful ways. Sometimes narrow laces are used and occasionally lace is posed over ruffles on the silk.
Nearest of kin to the breakfast coat is the matinee, which blossoms out before the holidays each year. It is made of many kinds of material, including all those used for negligees and breakfast coats, but is short and worn with a petticoat, which may or may not match it. Matinee is a pretty name, but not the only one applied to short garments that answer to "bed sacques" or "combing jackets", as well. Of course ribbons, laces, stitchery and chiffon or ribbon flowers add to the allurements of these pretty affairs. An evening petticoat with a wide flounce extends its usefulness when worn with a matinee, and together they make a cheerful breakfast costume.
The most popular of all negligees just now is the lounging robe of cotton corduroy. It offers the lure of comfort for chilly mornings, along with fascinating colors and a silky sheen, and can safely invite comparison in the matter of good looks. It comes in American beauty and bright red, rose, helma, bright blues and orchid.

American Woman Restores Hattonchatel

Frenchmen and Americans met the other day at Hattonchatel, just north of St. Mhiel, France, to celebrate the completion of the rebuilding of the village. Hattonchatel is the village where the two forces of American troops met when, after working from the east and west, they had driven the German forces from the St. Mhiel salient in September, 1918. Hattonchatel is directly on the line in the Toul sector which American troops occupied until the end of the war, after the salient had been taken. The village was under constant shell fire because it was located on a promontory which was used by the French and the Americans as an observation post. Its forty dwellings were laid in ruins.
Miss Belle Skinner of Holyoke, Mass., had spent her summers in Hattonchatel before the war and loved the place. So she gave a million dollars, more or less, to rebuild the dwellings and the church and town hall. They say that all the dwellings have modern American plumbing and running water—which must seem passing strange to villagers who have been used to carrying water from an ancient Roman well.
There was a noteworthy gathering of dignitaries at the celebration, including President Poincare. Miss Skinner was the guest of honor, received public thanks and saw a bronze medallion of herself placed in the town hall. The Bishop of Verdun blessed the bell of the church, one of her gifts.
