EX-SERVICE MAN MADE HAPPY ON ARMISTICE DAY

PENDLETON, Or., Nov. 13.—Yesterday was a good Armistice day for Harry Hendrickson, ex-service man, because he was able to free himself of the suspicion of having committed a crime which circumstantial evidence had led the officers of Klamath and Umatilla counties to believe he might have committed.
On September 29 a man was killed during a holdup and robbery in Klamath county. The only clew the officers could get as to the identity of the holdup man was an army slicker. Through the war department at Washington it was established that the slicker bearing the number of the one found near the crime had been issued to Harry Hendrickson. He was traced to Umatilla county.
On Sunday night Sheriff Low of Klamath county and Sheriff Houser of Umatilla county found Hendrickson's brother John and then Harry Hendrickson. He immediately identified the slicker as having been his, but declared that he had pawned the garment in Portland. He had been working constantly on a Umatilla county ranch since September 19, and he was freed of all complicity in the Klamath county crime.

28 BOOTLEGGERS NABBED IN BEND DRY RAIDS

BEND, Nov. 13.—Swooping down on the bootlegging fraternity of Bend after painstakingly gathering evidence for the last two weeks, state and county officers Saturday night made 28 arrests, confiscated three autos and made it necessary for Justice of the Peace E. D. Gilson to hold night court until 5 o'clock Sunday morning. Cash bail amounting to \$2000 was accepted.
One woman, Mrs. Mae Ward, pleaded guilty to selling liquor and must pay a fine of \$500 and serve six months in jail. Stutsman and John Gordon pleaded guilty to selling, but were not sentenced. Charles Carroll, Charles Williams, Fred Wilkinson, Etta Wilkinson, Mae Parker, John Sovich and Mark Martevovich are also charged with selling.
Others arrested will continue to appear on the records as "John Doe" or "Jane Doe" until hearings are resumed Tuesday morning, when an effort will be made to learn their true names.
The raids were under the direction of George L. Cleaver, chief of state prohibition forces.

SLIPPERY CURVES ARE SANDED ON HIGHWAY

THE DALLES, Nov. 14.—Because of the danger to automobiles and passengers of vehicles on the Columbia River highway between here and Mosier, the state highway department has ordered the pavement to be sprinkled at several bad turns on the road. Three cars have gone over a 200 foot embankment near Rowena during the past week, and numerous others have crashed in head-on collisions as the result of icy pavement. Five people have been more or less seriously injured and three are now in the hospital with the fate of one doubtful. Drivers are warned to go slow and avoid coasting around curves.
