SOPHIA, Nov. 15.—The wave of communism that resulted in recent disturbances in various parts of Bulgaria is subsiding. Those communistic bands that participated in several uprisings are rapidly breaking up and authorities are confident that organized communism soon will be stamped out in Bulgaria.

The determined campaign launched by the Bulgarian government resulted in the communist leaders and their followers being compelled to flee to the hills. Always they were pursued by the authorities and given no opportunity to rest. Now cold weather has come in the mountains and as a result the harassed communists are being compelled to leave the hills. Many of them are surrendering voluntarily to the authorities, while others are being captured as they come from the mountains to seek shelter in the lowland villages.

One noticeable thing about the membership of these bands is the number of young women and young men affiliated with them. Large numbers of women and impressive young men made up the following of the communist agitators and many of them who have surrendered have given the authorities important information concerning the plans for the communist uprising.

According to stories told the authorities, the communist organizers promised the village peasants that they would become high officials and the ruling class if they would join the movement for the overthrow of the bourgeois government. These stories also have revealed that the communist uprising would have been staged much earlier had it not been for the refusal of the peasants to forsake their fields during the busy crop-gathering season.

One woman told the investigating officials that she had made more than 100 red flags to be waved by the victorious communist army which the organizers promised would spring up in the land to work miracles for the peasants. Another revealed the hiding place of a machine gun which she said had been smuggled in from Russia.

That there are many within the communist ranks who are opposed to the revolutionary programme was revealed by Major Vankoff, one of the witnesses before the investigating body. Major Vankoff admitted that he had attended the communist meetings in Sofia and that he was aware of plans for a coup against the government. He declared, however, that he and Major Brakaloff admonished against the plan, declaring that the country was not ready for the change from a bourgeois government to a soviet. The communistic leaders, however, persuaded a majority that the communists in Russia and Serbia would come to their aid and that the coup could not fail of success.

**Recipes You'll Like**

**Cocoanut Birthday Cake**

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, separated
- 2 Cups flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 cup milk
- 3/4 cup fresh-keeping cocoanut
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
- red currant or raspberry jam

Beat butter and sugar until creamy, add yolks of eggs, well beaten milk, cocoanut, whites of eggs beaten to a stiff froth, flour sifted with baking powder, and then add extract. Mix and bake in two layers. Cool and put together with sugar less cocoanut frosting made as follows: Beat one egg white until stiff, and add two tablespoons honey or syrup and as much cocoanut as it will hold (about one-third of a cup). Spread the top of the cake with red jam and sprinkle over with cocoanut.

**Cocoanut Blanc Mange with Lemon Sauce**

- 4 cups milk
- 1/2 cup cornstarch
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 3 egg-whites
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup fresh-keeping cocoanut
- 1 teaspoonful vanilla extract
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups hot water
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 egg-yolk
- 1 lemon

Scald milk, add cornstarch mixed with sugar, cook ten minutes, then add cocoanut, vanilla and whites of eggs beaten with salt. Pour into a wet mould and set aside to chill. Turn out, decorate with cocoanut and serve with lemon sauce made as follows: Mix cornstarch with sugar, add water.

**Shoulder of Pork**

Have bones removed from the shoulder of a young pig. Make a dressing by mixing two cups of soft bread crumbs, seasoned with one-half teaspoon each of salt, pepper, sage and a little chopped celery; moisten with one-third cup of melted butter and fill the space where the bone was removed. Take a few stitches with a larding needle to hold the dressing in place; dredge the meat with flour and place in a moderate oven; baste frequently. Peel an apple for each service. For six apples make a syrup of one cup each of sugar and water; cook the apples in the syrup turning often and taking care not to break. When tender, remove to a pan, sprinkle with sugar and brown in the oven. Use as a garnish for the pork.

**Tripe and Sweetbreads**

There are two varieties of meat that are first made tender by long slow cooking and then broiled. These are tripe and sweetbreads. Tripe is usually inexpensive while sweetbreads are considered a delicacy and bring a high price in most localities. Tripe may be purchased fresh or pickled. It should be covered with boiling water and slowly simmered until tender; then it is ready for the various methods of preparation. Sweetbreads spoil very quickly and should be cooked the day they are purchased. Soak in cold water at least an hour, changing the water several times; remove skin, veins, etc., cover with boiling salted water, add one teaspoonful of lemon juice or vinegar and let simmer until tender, about thirty minutes. Drain cover with cold water for ten minutes, then wipe dry and they are ready to use for the various dishes.

This legal principle was established by the Sofia Circuit Court in a recent decision growing out of the fire in the National Theatre a year ago which caused the death of four persons and did thousands of dollars damage. Following the fire Tsankoff, the director of the theatre, and Popoff, the stage manager, were indicted on charges of criminal negligence. Tsankoff is a famous Bulgarian poet and composer, while Popoff has been known on the Bulgarian stage for forty years as a popular actor.

The court found that the fire was caused by a rustic lamp which the technical director had deemed indispensable to the performance. Inasmuch as this had nothing to do with the artistic side of the performance, with which Tsankoff and Popoff were concerned, the court decided that they were not guilty of any negligence in connection with the fire.
