EDUCATION AND DEMOCRACY

This day marks the beginning of National Education Week, a week during which American men and women are expected to give more than a passing thought to education, its benefits, its effects, and the improvement of its facilities.

The Declaration of Independence and the preamble of the American Constitution state plainly the objects of the separation from Great Britain on the one hand and the advantages which it was expected would be attained through the establishment of the Federal Government on the other.

Organized government, then, in America means that individuals are entitled to protection from assault, arrest, and invasion of property, except as provided by law. It signifies that in this country one may pursue any occupation or pleasure so long as it does not interfere with the rights and privileges of others.

For these purposes and innumerable others every man, woman, and child in the country, directly or indirectly, contributes to the expenses of the Federal, State and local government. The bill is small for the services and the advantages which are secured.

Occasionally the Government does not seem to provide a remedy for all the difficulties of public concern and interest or it may be that justice is secured only after longer delays than seem necessary of justifiable. Consequently there arises sharp public criticism and even discontent.

Such situations may be attributed to one or both of two causes. Either the people through their representatives have not conferred sufficient authority and provided adequate legal means to meet the situation or the governmental officials are lethargic in performing their duty.

In either case the remedy lies with the people themselves. The blame can not be shifted because the people of the United States have undertaken to govern themselves.

It is impossible, however, for the citizen shareholders of the American Government to fulfill their whole duty to the Nation merely by good intentions and a patriotic attitude. National, State and local problems confronting the Government are peculiarly complex. To solve them demands not only patriotism but intelligence.

Popular education is, therefore, an absolute necessity in a democracy. Those who are interested in our form of Government for the blessings it bestows on each individual in the country as well as for the example it sets for the rest of the world should realize that its preservation and development depends on popular education.

CAPITAL IS MOVING (?) OUT

In filing necessary papers for an appeal on the state income tax measure, C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon Voter asserted that millions of dollars of capital intended for investment in Oregon were being withdrawn. The Oregonian, from its once tall tower in Portland, heralds to the four corners of the state the fact that many corporations maintaining branch houses in Oregon would hereafter transact their business through offices at Seattle and San Francisco.

As a state Oregon has had no income tax for 69 years, yet Washington and California have outstripped us in growth of population and increase of wealth. How will the representative of the tax-dodging, wealth accumulating interests explain this condition? They can not at-

tribute it to the income tax. They can not cry freak laws, for we have been holding to the hind teat from the beginning. The fact that we are in the rear in the development of Pacific Coast States is not due to freak legislation but is the result of mossbackism and over-conservatism in the upper Wilamette valley and in Portland.

Conditions have experienced a rather marked change during the past decade. The younger, more progressive men in Portland and that section of the state have been fighting, and successfully too, to break the fetters that have retarded the growth and development of their city and state.

The adoption of the state income tax bill occasions another outcry of calamity that will result in more injury than the law can possibly effect. Other states have been under the jurisdiction of the same kind of a law for several years.

Frankly speaking, the income tax law needs amending. It may possibly not work with the precision and smoothness that is expected. But the principle of the law is right, and there is no occasion to give Oregon adverse advertising by howling about the millions of capital that will leave the state.

RIGHTFUL USE OF MONEY AS ESSENTIAL AS SAVING

What is thrift? Does it mean anything more than just saving money?

Recently an elderly lady in New York lost her life-time savings of \$500 which she was carrying in a bag sewed in her clothing. Postmaster General New made the statement not long ago that \$1,000,000,000 a year is lost by the people of the United States who purchase fraudulent securities through the mail—an amount, by the way, equal to two-thirds of the estimated total cost of government in the United States, including Federal, county, city, town and village expenses.

The newspapers frequently tell us of cases where savings have been swept away through carelessness or cupidity.

What, therefore, did these persons gain by saving their money? Would they not have been just as well off had they spent their funds as they earned them? These questions, which quite naturally arise in the minds of many, are an indication of the need of a more general understanding of real thrift.

It is thrifty to save money. It is just as much a part of thrift to know what to do with it after it has been saved. These facts point the way to one of our greatest public duties.

Our government is doing everything it can to encourage the saving of money. Our banks are making similar laudable efforts. In our schools, children are being taught to save. School savings banks are growing rapidly all over the country.

But not enough is being done and said to bring out the fact that the right care and use of savings constitutes a vital part of thrift practice.

Redfield, of Chicago, concluded that many exceptionally great men have been the product of families in which late marriage, or at least late parenthood, has been the rule.

This would seem to point to the superiority of children born from adult parents, that is, parents at least beyond twenty-five years of age. It is apparently true that the greatest men do not come from lines of ancestors who became parents at early ages.

Prof. Karl Pearson, a British investigator of genetics, following certain inquiries, came to the conclusion that first-born children were usually inferior to those that followed, although some other students of the question hold that his researches were not extensive enough to justify this conclusion.
