Since June he had been in charge of the moulding department at the foundry and is said by his employers to have been a steady and efficient workman. His exact age is not known here but is said to be around 30 years. His family, consisting of father, mother, four sisters and two brothers, reside at Sacramento. O'Brien was formerly a ball player and is reported to have played in some of the minor leagues.

LONDON, Nov. 26—The joy of life is not in outward things, and therein many of the present generation make their great mistake. Thus Ramsey MacDonald, leader of the Labor Party sums up today state that he is recovering and his condition is not serious.

Purely Accidental

Due to the shock of the tragedy and the excitement prevailing during the few brief seconds of the accident, the two young ladies are somewhat doubtful as to just what caused the car to go over the bank. The road where this accident occurred is narrow, constructed of dirt and is extremely dangerous, and it is barely possible that the outer edge of the road gave way. O'Brien was driving slowly and that he was exercising due caution is substantiated not only by the ladies, but by the tourists whom they met.

Will Investigate.

Mayor C. L. Loomis, whose car was wrecked, has requested a thorough investigation and if it is found that it was unavoidable on the part of the driver and due to the dangerous road it is likely that legal action will be instituted. Last night's accident is said to be the fourth fatal wreck on that section of the Pacific highway this year.

It is not known how badly damaged the car is, but it is believed to be all but a total wreck. Go to Yreka.

Mrs. C. L. and Wm. Loomis and others left this forenoon for Yreka, where they will see that proper attention is given to Watson and where they will attend the inquest to be held over the remains of O'Brien and render all possible assistance.

Wild Rumors Fly

Many rumors concerning the accident were afloat this forenoon. One report was widely circulated that Mayor Loomis was in the car, and that the man killed was Jas. McGuire; also that Miss Loomis was seriously injured. The foregoing are the facts of the accident, which comes as a shock to the community.
