

# Premium Lists and Rules for Exhibits Winter Fair

## CLUB WORK EXHIBITS ARE OFFERED LIBERAL PREMIUMS FOR FAIR

The management of the Ashland Winter Fair believes strongly in the value of Club Work for boys and girls. They are offering the following prizes to Jackson County Clubs to encourage this work. Of this matter Secretary T. H. Fuller says:

"We believe that the two weeks summer school given by the Oregon Agricultural College in June to the members of the Boys' and Girls' clubs is very valuable. To assist clubs in sending one or more members to the school we are offering to any Jackson County Club organized and working during the season of 1923, and making an exhibit at the Ashland Winter Fair, in the Club booth, one third of a scholarship to the O. A. C. summer school in June 1923.

These exhibits must conform to the following rules:

**Sewing Clubs**—At least twelve pieces from each club and not less than three members exhibiting.

**Homemaking Clubs**—At least eight exhibits from each club with not less than three members exhibiting.

**Cooking Clubs**—At least twelve exhibits from each club with not less than three members exhibiting.

**Canning Clubs**—At least twelve jars from each club with not less than three exhibitors.

**Corn Clubs**—At least ten ears exhibited with not less than three exhibitors.

**Chicken Clubs**—At least three pens of two birds each, three members exhibiting.

**Turkey Club**—Two pens of two birds each, two members exhibiting.

**Potato Club**—Two exhibits of one peck each. Two exhibitors.

If any club exhibit does not show enough merit to warrant a one-third O. A. C. scholarship the judges may award a one-fifth scholarship instead.

Because of lack of space for live stock exhibits no prizes are offered this year to these clubs. It is hoped that another year the Ashland Winter Fair may be able to offer prizes to all Jackson County Clubs.

- Any person or group of school children up to ten in number can compete. The foregoing statement sounds rather unfair to the one but considering that the children have so little time, and the contest is of educational value, the instigator of the idea hopes that grouping in such a way will stimulate the children to get together, with the help of some older person, and see how many unique gifts can be worked out.

- Each collection exhibited is to have as many different suggestions in it as possible. Any pieces of materials or left overs of yarns, etc. that would not be utilized ordinarily may be used without considering them as an item of expense. The amount of embroidery cotton or paint used may be estimated per piece exhibited.

- Each article must have the approximate cost neatly tagged on it with the individuals or group's name on tag.

- All articles must be in to Mrs. Victor Mills the day before the Fair opens.

The awards will be made on the following points:

- Number of varied types of gifts.

- Attractiveness of gift.

## PREMIUMS FOR NEEDLECRAFT

Plans for Needlework Department of Winter Fair Are Completed.

Ladies' Art Club Will Be In Charge of Department—List of Premiums Are Increased.

The Ladies' Art Club will again have charge of the Art Needlework Department of the Winter Fair and Mrs. Selma Gray will be Supt. of this section. The department will be known as section 2 of the Art Department.

A much greater list of premiums will be offered than heretofore and blue, red and white ribbons, appropriately printed will designate the winners as well as the regular cash premiums. The following rules will be observed:

- No premium shall be awarded when the exhibit is unworthy, though there be no competition.

- Articles must be entered by the maker.

- No article can be entered which has been previously exhibited at this fair.

- All articles must be clean. No worn or soiled articles can be entered.

- Clothing and needlework must be pressed.

- Unfinished articles will not be given premiums.

- All embroidery work must be judged as to simplicity of design, color, neatness of finished work, and fitness of material used.

## PREMIUM LIST FOR AGRICULTURAL AND ORCHARD PRODUCTS

In this department it has been deemed advisable to offer the principal prizes for best general exhibit of agricultural and horticultural products from individual producers. Ample space will be allowed for this purpose and all parties intending to compete should obtain blanks and notify the secretary not later than December 1.

Articles in this Department must be made up from the products of individual farms, display to be grown by the exhibitor. Three prizes will be offered consisting of—1st—\$10.00, 2nd—\$5.00, 3rd—\$2.50. (Specials are also offered in this class.)

The points upon which the judging will be based are:

## POULTRY PRIZE LIST FINISHED

Ninth Annual Poultry Show Will Be Important Feature of Winter Fair

Rules and Regulations Are Defined and Complete List of Awards Formerly Announced

The Tidings present today complete rules and regulations for the Ninth Annual Poultry Show of Southern Oregon, which will be a prominent feature of the coming Winter Fair. Indications point to one of the finest exhibits of poultry ever collected in the state.

**Rules**  
Rule 1. The ninth Annual Show of the Southern Oregon Poultry Association will be governed by the rules of the American Poultry Association. All prizes awarded strictly in accordance with the American Standard of Perfection.

Rule 2. Entries close December 1, 1923, at 10 o'clock.

Rule 3. Entry fee for poultry is fifty cents for each specimen. Pens, one dollar. Pigeons and ornamental fowls, twenty-five cents each, which includes cooping, care and feed.

Rule 4. All entries must be made in writing on entry blanks furnished by the Secretary.

Rule 5. Shipping coops must be marked with the name of the breed, sex, and number of birds contained and address of exhibitors so as to insure prompt return at the close of exhibition. CAUTION! Male birds should be shipped separately as they will fight on their return from the show.

Rule 6. Express charges must be paid in full by the shipper to the Ashland Winter Fair, Ashland, Oregon. It is not necessary to accompany birds.

Rule 7. All birds for exhibition must be received and in the show room not later than six P. M. December 5.

Rule 8. Immediately after awards by the Judge have been supervised and approved a ribbon designating first, second, and third prize shall be placed on the winning coops, blue, red and white. No advertising shall be permitted after the winners have been so designated.

Rule 9. During the continuance of the exhibit all specimens are to be under control of the Superintendent and cannot be removed except by his consent, but any specimens showing symptoms of disease will be immediately removed and returned to owner.

Rule 10. The terms "cock", "hen", "cockerel", and "pullet" are thus defined: Cock and hen are birds one year old and over; cockerel and pullet are birds under one year old. A breeding pen shall consist of one male and four females.

Rule 11. All birds entered for sale shall pay same fee as exhibitors birds.

Rule 12. When there is only one exhibitor in a class second money will be paid.

Rule 13. Protests against awards must be made in writing and delivered to the Secretary within twelve hours after the awards have been announced for the class accompanied by five dollars which will be returned if the protest is sustained.

Rule 14. All birds must be plainly banded and band numbers to correspond plainly marked on the entry blanks. When not placed on specimens the Superintendent will furnish same at a cost of ten cents each.

Rule 15. Handling of birds or rabbits on exhibition is positively prohibited except by the owner or on his authority by the regularly authorized official.

Rule 16. All stock must remain in the show room until after ten P. M. December eighth, and will be cared for until noon of the following day.

Rule 17. The latest regulations regarding Banded Plymouth Rock and S. C. Brown Leghorns will prevail, but in competing for specials the Standard Classes only will compete.

**Commercial Breeders Class**  
This class will include laying pens of six females.  
A special committee will have charge of this class.

The light weight breeds will be in a separate class from the heavy breeds.

Five entries in each class will be necessary to carry out the plan.

Cash premiums will be paid for the three pens laying the highest number of eggs for the four days, commencing Wednesday A. M. Concluding Saturday at five P. M.

**Prizes:** 1st—\$4.00; 2nd—\$2.00; 3rd—\$1.00.

**Single Entries and Breeding Pens**

The classes excepting in New Zealand and Flemish will consist of Senior Buck, Senior Doe, Junior Buck and Junior Doe. (Over six months senior, under six months junior.)

New Zealand classes are as follows: Does and litters, baby juniors, three to four months; Junior, four to six months; Intermediate, six to eight months; senior, over eight months.

Flemish are junior under six months, intermediate six to eight months, senior over eight months.
