FEDERAL GRAND JURY TO INDICT D'AUTREMONT'S

PORTLAND, Dec. 1.—The indictment of Ray, Roy, and Hugh D'Autremont, on charges of assaulting E. Daugherty, mail clerk, killed during the Siskiyou tunnel hold-up, will be asked Monday of the federal grand jury, United States Attorney Coke announced today. The three brothers are the subjects of a nation-wide search and have been indicted by the grand jury of Jackson county for the murder of Daugherty, and three members of the train crew.

Sen. Adams Underwent Examination

Senator Alva B. Adams (D.), of Colorado, had to pass a thorough searching political examination in order to qualify for the senate! The story of his appointment by Governor Sweet is without precedent.

Shortly after the death of Senator Nicholson last spring Democrats and Progressives in all parts of the country flooded Sweet with appeals, urging selection of favored candidates.

Woodrow Wilson asked Sweet to name Huston Thompson, member of the Federal Trade commission; Bryan and McAdoo backed Morrison Shafroth, son of the late Senator Shafroth; the La Follette adherents urged the appointment of Edward Keating, a member of the House and one of the leaders in the Plumb Plan fight.



Alva B. Adams Searching Questions

Two days before the appointment the Governor summoned Adams into his office at the State Capitol. Sweet's closest political advisers were there. They ran through all shades of Democratic and Progressive belief.

A questionnaire was presented to Adams covering a wide field of legislative questions. He was requested to state his views upon all of them. Oral questions were fired at him. Some of these Adams approved; others he made no bones about rejecting flatly. But in the main he passed the test in accordance with Sweet's views and was appointed to succeed Nicholson.

In announcing the selection, Sweet said:

FLEET OF PLANES IN SEARCH FOR LOST PILOT

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 1.—A half-score of airplanes are searching the path of airmail flyers over treacherous mountain peaks for a trace of air mail pilot Claire Vance, who has been missing since he departed from here yesterday from Reno, Nev. It is believed that he was forced down during the storm at some isolated place.

Adams has very set views on legislation. He is hailed as a progressive Democrat and generally may be expected to support the so-called liberal element in the senate. He wants to abolish the Railway Labor Board, alter certain important provisions of the Esch-Cummins transportation act, and favors a soldier's bonus.

First "Native Son."

He was born in Del Norte, Colorado, October 29, 1875, and is the first native-born son ever to sit in the senate. After graduation from Yale, in 1896, Adams entered the law school at Columbia University and was graduated with honors in 1899, returning immediately to his home in Pueblo to practice law.

From 1911 to 1915 he was city attorney in Pueblo and from 1910 to 1911 served as regent of the University of Colorado.

From an early age Adams was interested in politics, but he never sought a national office. In 1916 he was a delegate-at-large to the Democratic national convention. His father, Alva B. Adams, was three times governor of the state. During the World War Adams was a major in the office of the Judge Advocate General of the army. He is a member and a staunch supporter of the American Legion.

OBITUARY

Gertrude Neil Murphy, one of Ashland's oldest pioneers and known to scores of people and pioneers, passed away at the Murphy family home at 486 Boulevard, December 1, 1923 at four o'clock, a. m. at the age of 59 years, 10 months and 25 days. The deceased was born January 6, 1864 on the Neil home ranch on Neil creek, east of Ashland. She was the daughter of Louisa and Claybourn Neil, pioneers who came to Oregon from Tennessee

in 1853 and settled on Neil creek in 1854. She was a Native Daughter of Oregon. She resided at the family home until her marriage on June 18, 1884 to J. J. Murphy at Jacksonville, Oregon. Following her marriage, she was at home on the Murphy home ranch until 1914, when the family moved to Ashland.

They have resided at 486 Boulevard since that time and it was there that Mrs. Murphy died this morning. Deceased was the youngest of thirteen children, three of whom

survive. They are a sister, Mrs. W. E. Dean, of Grants Pass; J. C. Neil, of Granger, Wash.; and Wm. Neil, of Myrtle Creek, Oregon. Survivors of the immediate family are her husband, J. J. Murphy, and three sons Carl, Murray and Ray Murphy. Three grandchildren also survive. One daughter died in infancy and a son, Clyde, passed away six years ago. Funeral services are to be held Monday afternoon from the home at 486 Boulevard. Interment will be made at the Ashland Cemetery. J. P. Dodge and sons funeral directors.
