When only a boy Captain Applegate served in the Oregon State Militia and was commissioned a captain after displaying remarkable aptitude for military tactics. On November 29, 1872, when the Modoc outbreak occurred, Capservice of the United States Army to help subdue the rebellious Modoc Indians, who were headed by the notorious "Captain Jack," Captain Applegate rendered valuable service in the Modoc war owing to the fact that he was familiar with the Modoc Indians' mode of warfare and because he was also familiar with the territory over which much of the fighting took

The Chief of the Modoc (Old Sconchian) tribe remained loyal to the Government and rendered the United States Army valuable assistance in subduing the rebels. loyal it would have caused other tribes to have taken sides against the Government, and, with such a small number of United States soldiers and whites in the country, it thought such action on the part the combined Indian tribes
