700 CARS ENTERING CALIFORNIA DAILY

Officials of the road marking department of the Auto Club of Southern California, who have just returned from a tour of investigation and kept careful count at various principal points of the west bound traffic, estimate that 700 cars a day are now coming into California. Allowing four passengers to a car this would mean that motor cars alone are bringing 2800 people daily into the state.

More than 1000 persons a day come into Southern California in automobiles during the month of October over the National old Trails route.

THIRTEEN ESCAPE BY WAY OF OLD TUNNEL

LANSING, Dec. 5.—A clean getaway has been made by the 13 convicts who escaped from the Kansas state prison here Sunday, officials admitted today.

Poses and bloodhounds have followed to the end every possible trail and trace of the fugitives from the prison without result. An investigation showed that the missing prisoners had cut a hole through the wall of the power house, burrowed through five feet of dirt to the entrance of an abandoned tunnel 14x16 inches. Through this narrow hole, half filled with mud and slime, the men worked their way to liberty.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—"Gallant" Prince Henry is what they are calling the third son of King George V. since the wedding of the Crown Prince of Sweden to Lady Louise Mountbatten.

Whenever British royalty attends a function the question of precedence always is carefully observed by those in charge of the arrangements. Accordingly, at the wedding in question, care had been taken to see that all members of the Royal family were properly seated according to rank.

This arrangement resulted in the separation by a matter of three chairs of the Duke and Duchess of York, the "newlyweds" of the Windsor family. Prince Henry occupied the seat besides his brother where the Duchess would have sat had not precedence been so rigidly followed.

Prince Henry, young and apparently in closest sympathy with lovers, noticed the regretful glances and faintly disappointed sighs which the Duke and his bride exchanged when they discovered their separation. He could not stand to see them parted, so he caught the eye of the Duchess, winked, smiled, nodded and the Duchess, in perfect understanding, rose and exchanged seats with her generous brother-in-law.

The looks of happiness and gratitude on the faces of the Duke and the Duchess were reward enough to the Prince for his self-abnegation.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Two battle cruisers and five light cruisers, composing a British fleet division, time to practice the latest ball-room gyrations.
