NEVADA WOMAN BURNS TO DEATH IN HOUSE FALLON, Nev., Dec. 7.—Draped in her flaming home, Mrs. C. H. Fowler was burned to death on a ranch seven miles south of Fallon yesterday. Her husband, after several desperate efforts at rescue, was restrained by neighbors from perishing in the flames in a last wild dash into the flaming structure. The fire is thought to have been caused by kerosene poured into a stove. Mrs. Fowler's body was found in the ruins after the house was burned down. Mrs. Fowler was about 48 years old, and, besides her husband, leaves a daughter, parents, brother and sister.
