COLORADO IN THROES OF SEVERE BLIZZARD

DENVER, Dec. 10—Eight and one-half inches of snow, driven by a veritable gale has piled huge drifts and wrecked havoc throughout the state during the past twenty-four hours. One man, John Huston, 21, was run down by a Rock Island passenger train and instantly killed eight miles east of Colorado Springs when blinded by driving snow. Two companions escaped death shortly after when their bunkhouse caught fire, forcing them into the blizzard in their night clothes. A man, woman and child were rescued from a stalled automobile with their ears frozen and suffering from exposure.

(Continued from page 1) cost of conducting the penitentiary, which is under the control of the governor, was approximately \$10. In November, 1922, the per capita cost of operating this institution was \$24.71, while the report for November, 1923, showed that the cost had jumped to \$34.47.

The per capita cost of conducting the state school for the blind increased from \$44.77 in November, 1922, to \$47.15 in November 1923, while the per capita cost of conducting the state school for the deaf increased from \$32.19 to \$36.00.

All Within Budgets—Practically all of the institutions have operated within their appropriations during the first 11 months of the biennium and it is not likely that it will be necessary to create any deficiency appropriations.

The Government's expenditures for 1925 were estimated by the president in his budget at \$3,298,980,444, which is \$226,957,644 less than the net estimated expenditures for the current fiscal year. The receipts for the coming year were placed at \$3,693,762,078, so that the surplus which the president expects to have in

in his opinion, public interests required, I recommend a revision of tax laws along the lines which will effect reduction in income taxes by taxing earned incomes; by reducing the percentage of the normal tax and by reducing the surtax rates with commencement of their application at \$10,000 instead of \$6,000. "I also recommend the repeal of the tax on telegrams, telephones and leased wires, and of the tax on admissions, and revision of the miscellaneous taxes which are a source of inconvenience to the taxpayers and difficult to collect." The President said he knew of "nothing which will give the nation greater assurance that we are unalterably committed to a campaign of economy in expenditure of public funds than of reduction of our present taxation."
